Obituary

TARANAKI'S OLDEST RESIDENT DIES

Taranaki's oldest resident, Mr Solomon (Ted) Zinsli, died in Hawera on December 30th in his 104th year. He was a veteran of the 1870-71 Franco-Prussian War.

Born in Switzerland on February 28, 1856, Mr Zinsli came to New Zealand in 1878. Before then he had spent two years in Germany as a cobbler, and had been in England, Austria, Italy and Sicily.

He served in the Boer War with the New Zealand contingent. He came to Taranaki in 1887, moving to Waitara in 1921 after living at Waverley, Moumahaki and Eltham.

In the Franco-Prussian War, Mr Zinsli served as a young private in the Prussian 47th Infantry Division. He is survived by five sons, Harry (Napier), Jim (Hawera), George (Eltham), Charlie (Whakatane), Bernie (Wellington), and a daughter, Mrs May Anderson (Pahiatua).

"Ted," as the Swiss people very affectionately called him, was a Swiss with all his heart. Only two years ago, when I saw him at the Swiss Social Club 1st August Celebration in Kaponga, he looked fitter than many a man half his age. After his reply to a toast to his health, he sang the Swiss song "Ich bin ein Schweizerknabe und habe die Heimat lieb" (I am a Swiss Boy and I love my Fatherland). Well, dear Ted, the love is mutual, the old Fatherland loves sons like you, too.

To his relatives we extend our sincerest sympathy.

SPRINGDALE

Wilhelmina Katrina Uttinger came to New Zealand in February, 1913, with the intention of marrying her boyfriend, Joseph Carl Schumacher, who preceded her to this country by some two years. The couple married on April 14th, 1913, in Kaponga. They started farming on their own account and eventually became the proud owners of a farm on Cheal Road, Ngaere. The happy marriage was blessed with one son and two daughters—Mina, now Mrs Joe Arnett, Springdale, and Rosa, Mrs Charles Steiner, also of Springdale. Their son died in 1947 and Mr Schumacher in 1951. Mrs Schumacher decided to live in Springdale on her son-in-law's residence where she kept her own cottage. She loved it there very much amongst her growing number of grandchildren, but all the time she could not forget Taranaki with its unique Mount Egmont which reminded her constantly of Switzerland, and from time to time took occasional trips to see her relatives and friends there. Mrs Schumacher was a very keen supporter of the Hamilton Swiss Club and not many of its functions passed without her presence. We will miss her very much.

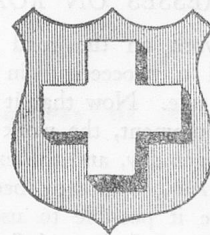
