Wine Harvest Festivals — a Swiss Autumn Custom

After the grapes have been picked, festivals are held everywhere in the wine-growing regions of Switzerland. On the first weekend in October these wine harvest festivals take place in Lugano, Morges, and —this year for the 50th time—in Neuchatel. The programme is made up of a variety of attractions, such as carnival of flowers, children's procession and confetti battle. Market stalls and temporary bars are put up in the streets and some of the fountains run with wine. A week later come the festivals in Lutry and Spiez. In the wine-growing villages on the northern bank of the Lake of Biel the festivals take place on five successive Sundays, with entertainment and here and there small parades as well.
