## VISITOR FROM WELLINGTON

Shortly before the announced 700 Years of Switzerland Celebrations by the Swiss Communities in New Zealand, the Swiss Embassy sent Mr P. Graf on an official visit to the Auckland Swiss Club to answer all these precious questions and queries regarding, AHV, Military, Swiss Nationality, etc. etc. There was a full house and most inquiries were about the AHV.

Below a few interesting details:

— Mr Graf said that for a full pension a man needed to pay premium for 44 years and a woman for 41 years. For every year lost the pension will be reduced by 2.2% and he also said that what's not paid is lost.

— The AHV Premium is 9% of the gross income if the income is SFr. 36,000 or more. The premium will go down as far as 4.8% for incomes less than above.

— The premium is normally based on the gross income but if one does not work and still wants to remain insured the premium depends on the existing assets. According to Mr Graf, the average premium payments vary but are roughly between 400.- to 700.-Franken per year.

— If returned to CH broke or earning less than SFr 20,000.- a year apparently one will get an extraordinary pension, (900.-/single, 1300.- double).

— The Swiss Embassy no longer handles payments from and to Swiss living abroad. One has to deal direct with the AHV Head Office in Geneva.

— out of 4500 Swiss people in New Zealand, 250 pay towards AHV and 200 receive AHV.



— The Swiss Embassy will never pass on information regarding AHV money etc, to anyone.

A few other questions re. the other topics were shot at P. Graf before the meeting got heated up by a discussion about our 700 Year Celebration and the Embassy's unexpected interference. Mr Graf, who appeared to be taken by surprise had to play a lot of his diplomatic cards. He was given a pretty firm message to take back to Wellington by the attending people. But anyway, the committee and many members would like to extend their thanks to P. Graf for his good job and are looking forward to his next (?) appearance in Auckland.
