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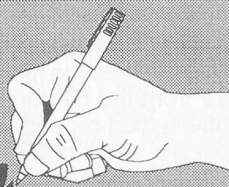
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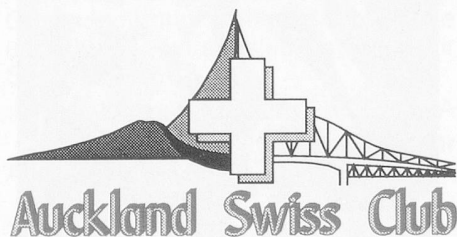

THE VISIT OF SWISS MINISTER OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS, ROLF BODENMÜLLER

About 100 people came to listen to **Mr. Bodenmüller** at Osci's Café 'Prost Ethnic' on 16 March. The following are a few pieces of information we picked up that evening.

4,500 registered Swiss in NZ - 16,000 in Aussi - more than 500,000 Swiss away from CH - 120,000 in France - 200,000 (5.5%) unemployed Swiss - 1.8% inflation & dropping - every 2nd Swiss Frank comes from abroad - 17 Billion gross National Deficit - 8 Billion Government loans dropping to 7 Bio. - 60 Billion Social Welfare cost per year - AHV cost will increase by 50% in next 20 years - more retired then employed folks - Less murders in CH - Petty & drug related crimes on increase - more than 50% of the females are worried to go out in the dark - drastic reduction in Farm subsidies - 1000 Farms close down or are integrated in big farms per year - an estimated one third of farms will disappear in CH - 1.2 Million (18%) foreigners in CH (highest % quota in Europe - Armee 1995, 15 weeks RS (instead of 17) - WK only every 2 years - army retirement age 42 (was 50) - Army still compulsory for men (optional for women) - general army reduction from 600,000 to 400,000 men - all old weapons will be abolished - hottest topic at present is 'European Union' to join or not to join - a survey shows that Swiss in general do not approve of the EG - 600 blue helmet men approved - Winter Olympic games brought 11 medals - no more young skiers in Swiss teams (the snow nation will be left behind) - after 28 years the 1st time in soccer world champion.

AHV for Swiss abroad costs more then 100,000 Mio. - Bill to abolish AHV for Swiss abroad in preparation - Dual Nationals are not expected to claim welfare from CH - 6.9% of NZ Swiss take voting right in CH - 1995/96 Radio Schweiz will broadcast via Satellite - Book "Ratgeber für Auslandschweizer" full of tips is free of charge (contact Embassy) - Swiss going home will be assisted to find work (ask Embassy for details) - a spouse of a Swiss can apply for Swiss citizenship after 6 years of marriage. **EGB**

Minister Rolf Bodenmüller, Head of the Unit for the Swiss Abroad in Berne, and our new Ambassador, Ernst Thurnheer, addressed the about 40 people who gathered for this occasion. Mr Bodenmüller's speech was very informative, presenting a vast amount of interesting facts and figures in a clear and concise manner. It again brought home to me just how much simpler life in New Zealand really is, and how much more I am in control of it over here. Particularly the issue of 'foreigners' in Switzerland still seems a problematic one, if anything is getting worse. The uneasy response of Mr Bodenmüller to some related questions, seems symbolic for the position of Government and people to this rather difficult issue. The Swiss Government,

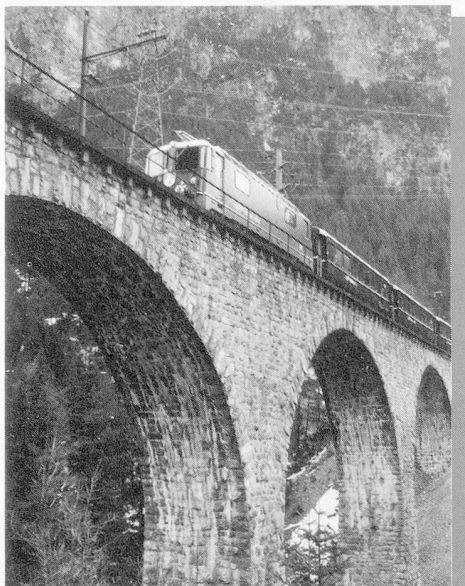

Especially so in those "hard" (economic) times Switzerland is currently going through. PROGRAMME

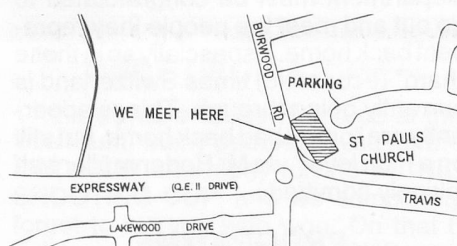

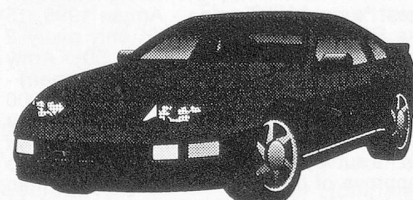

OBITUARY

Waitara man lived for skiing and mountain climbing. Mountain man Don DORFLINGER has died, aged 74. The Waitara man's life revolved around his family and mountain activities, especially skiing. Close friend Bob Stokes, New Plymouth, said Mr. Dorflinger was a member of the New Zealand ski team in 1950 and 1953. He had also been a Taranaki and North Island ski champion. His talent on the snow came from humble beginnings, with his first skis made from barrel staves. Born in Eltham to Swiss parents, Mr Dorflinger's interest in mountains probably came from his ancestry, said Mr. Stokes. Mr. Dorflinger first began climbing on the mountain in the mid 1930s and he was an early member of the Stratford Mountain Club. He was also a long-time member of the Hawera-based Mt. Egmont Alpine Club. During World War II, he fought in the Pacific and on his return worked as a sheet metal worker in Stratford for a few years. In the late 1940s he became a dairy farmer at Mahoe. "That was as close as he could get to the mountain", Mr. Stokes said. A past club captain of the Stratford Mountain Club, Mr. Dorflinger was the president from 1963-1965 and was made a life member in 1969. He was a very enthusiastic person as far as the mountain was concerned. He was a serious-minded person and he had a great sense of humour when he liked to show it. In his later years, Mr Dorflinger spent a lot of time helping with improvements to the East Egmont ski field. Even in recent years he would be digging out the (Manganui) gorge track when younger skiers would be coming up for the day. He was also a member of the Egmont National Park Board in the late 1960s. About that time, he also retired from farming and moved to New Plymouth for a short time and then on to Waitara. Mr. Dorflinger is survived by his wife, Eileen, and children Marie, Robert, Annette and Clare. L.K.

Botanical Trip through the Kaitoke Regional Park. A sparkling February Sunday invited us all to explore the famous Kaitoke Regional Park. We chose the Swingbridge to cross the Hutt River, then followed the trail downstream through the blossoming rimu and rata forest. It was an amazing sight! Many native trees and bushes had signs

Rimu/rata/hinau/kamahia forest is found in the more fertile river flats, ascending into the Red beech/rimu/kamahia forest on the lower slopes.
