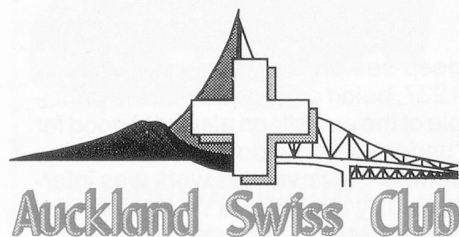

February-March

Two years had passed and Wellington was once more sparkling during the International Festival of the Arts. More than 1000 musicians, singers, actors, dancers, writers, artists of all kinds congregated in the Capital, among them some of the most exciting and original

The funniest, most ironic and most entertaining play must have been "Lovelock's dream run" by Wellington author David Geary. His hero worship is a way of escaping the almost intolerable pressures of homosexual adolescence. Alternating between schoolboy realities and adolescent fantasies, it was indeed a remarkable theatrical performance.
