There is currently much debate in Switzerland about the choice of languages being taught in schools.

In Kanton Zurich, school officials believe English to be so important, they now want children to learn this first, ahead of French, an official Swiss language.

Here in New Zealand, we hold the advantage, in a global sense, as English is already our first language. However, when it comes to learning a second language - we fall behind.

But many of us, who are now second or even third generation Swiss, have a great opportunity to learn a second language - and we should all encourage the use Swiss or German (or in some cases French / Italian) in our homes as much as possible.

Taking my own case as an example, during our childhood, Swiss dialect was usually spoken by our parents. This made for some very fascinating dialogue, as we (my brother, sister and I) responded in English, resulting in single conversations using two completely different languages!! Although this sounded rather odd to 'outsiders', such a situation was quite common for us, along with many other families.

The main advantage for us was, that although we often felt a little awkward speaking Swiss, preferring to use English, we did understand all of what was being said in Swiss.

For me, my knowledge of the Swiss language became a great asset when I went to spend a year (which turned into eight!) in Switzerland. I was in what was then for me a foreign country, but at least I was able to understand the language - because I had always heard it.

My speaking skills needed to be 'developed' a little, but improvement was speedy - afterall, nobody really spoke English where I was, and I had little choice but to use Swiss to communicate with those around me.

So, for anyone who is able, why not give your children, or your grandchildren, the opportunity to learn some Swiss? By passing this unique and diverse language to the next generation, they will then also have the ability to communicate with the peo-

visit Switzerland one day.
