Materials needed:

2 inch Terra Cotta Clay Pot Small button String 3/4 inch Jingle Bell 20 cm long Ribbon Paint

Instructions:

Paint your bell with Swiss images or decorate them with Swiss stickers.

Knot the ends of the ribbon.

Attach a piece of string to the bottom of the ribbon.

Thread the string through the hole in the pot. Pull it tight so that the ribbon sits nicely on top of the pot.

Thread the button through the string and tie the string so that the button sits right against the hole of the pot.

Thread the bell through the string and tie it on so that it can swing loosely against the pot.
