Both were born into hard working farming families, and life was tough. They arrived in New Zealand by ship/plane in 1962 where they made a farming life for themselves and the growing family in the Waikato and King Country Districts. Both worked extremely hard, and the children Beatrice, Lawrence (deceased), Irene, Yvo, Denise and Rita have many fond memories of family life on the farm at Waitomo, which they broke in from raw bush, building a home and lifestyle. Both have been able to take trips back to their homeland. Their memory lives on - the family home was relocated as a trampers' hut to Leach's Clearing in the Whareorino Forest south of PioPio known today as the ALPIGER HUT.

May they both rest in peace.
