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# THE "SWISS OBSERVER" 30 YEARS AGO

On 1st July 1939, we read that the Assembly of the Swiss Abroad had been held at the Federal Shooting Contest in Lucerne. The Government had accepted Parliament's proposal to control Swiss newspapers' funds, though it was considered difficult to check the 523 dailies. The "Neue Zürcher Zeitung" and the "Bund" had been prohibited in Italy. From the "Tribune de Genève", an article on the Battle of Laupen was reprinted, and a long appreciation of a Russian film on Peter the Great appeared — what had that to do with Switzerland or the Swiss? There was also a little notice in German about a new idea on making windows airtight.

Results of the "Tir Fédéral" appeared in the following issue, and, under a photo of the flag of the London Swiss Rifle Team, we heard that London had finished in 6th place. A photo appeared of the sculptress Bingguely-Lejeune whose bust of the Rt. Hon. The Viscount Nuffield also appeared in picture in that issue, following a successful exhibition. "Lessons of the Swiss National Exhibition in Zurich" and news of the Lucerne Music Festival appeared together with an appeal to compatriots to attend the First of August Celebration to be held in London for the first time officially. A lot of football news completed the issue.

On 15th July, we learned that Switzerland had finished third in the International Shooting Competition held in Lucerne, and that she had become World Champion in the International Army Rifle and Pistol Shooting Competition. The newly constructed short wave station of Schwarzenburg had been gutted by fire. 10,000 refugees, mostly Jewish, were in Switzerland during the summer of 1939, 3,000 of whom without means of subsistence. The Zurich Rowing Club had won the Stewards' Challenge Cup at the Henley Regatta. A long article was reprinted from "The Listener", in which Prof. W. Rappard, Geneva, described the "Swiss Political Tradition".

The next issue carried the announcement that the new Swiss Minister in London would be Monsieur Walter Thurnheer, in succession to Monsieur Paravicini who had been in London for a quarter of a century. Seven Swiss Nazis and one German had been sentenced to imprisonment in Zurich (espionage). The Lord Mayor of London had paid a visit to the Swiss National Exhibition.

The last issue in July 1939 described various new measures Switzerland had been and was taking with regard to her defence in order to safeguard her neutrality in a time of increasing tension. 23 British architects were on a tour of Switzerland. A Swiss Himalayan expedition had succeeded for the first time to ascend the Dunagari (7,060 metres). The well-known Swissair pilot and author Walter Ackermann had been killed in an aircrash near Constance. More copious "Notes and Gleanings" by Kyburg filled a good part of the

paper, comments on newspaper reports, mixed with the writer's own opinions.
