
Basle, the home of silk ribbons

Anyone strolling around Basle, through the old streets and alleys near the cathedral, or under the trees of the wide avenues leading out of the town, can admire, more so than in any other city, beautiful, impressive and unspoiled facades, richly decorated with metal grills at the windows and monumental gates of wrought iron. These bear witness to the period of great prosperity of the silk ribbon industry, which had such a great influence on the fortunes of this Rhine city and gave it a tradition and a personality of which it is justly proud.

But it was on the whims and vagaries of fashion that this industry, perhaps the finest in all Switzerland, depended. In the faded old trade registers, we can still admire today samples of unbelievable wonders in richly worked pure silk, ribbons worn with such an air by the Cleantes and Dorimenes of Louis XIV's time, in the form of bows, cockades and in cascades,



from head to toe, or gay, brightly coloured ribbons that the shepherdesses of the Trianon tied to their crooks. Down through the years however there were also periods of severity and austerity when ribbons were banished, and when severe fashions prevailed, an excessive enthusiasm for uniforms and the masculine cut.



But nowadays every woman wants, and quite rightly so, to appear feminine. What could be more natural then that she should turn to silk ribbons, a dress accessory offering unlimited scope to her love of finery in the form of a thousand and one delightful variations! Inclined by nature to be constantly seeking after elegance in its different forms, and taking into consideration the typically feminine fondness for variety, the Basle silk ribbon manufacturers are continually introducing new designs and new shades, as well as qualities in keeping with the most recent improvements achieved in the field of textiles. This spring the striped or checked organdie ribbons, as light as summer butterflies, give a particularly ethereal charm to the delightful little straw hats for the spring and summer. Taffeta ribbons too appear in new colour combinations and the velvet ribbon itself, ageless and popular for many centuries now, is capable of variations and adaptations: according to the requirements of fashion, it may be soft and have the dull sheen of silk, or short-napped and stiff, or even shiny like the reflection of sun on water.

Last season and this spring, the Parisian designers and milliners have shown their preference for the classical grosgrain ribbon. Plain, striped or checked, it is seen on sporty looking hats, in the form of straps

to be buttoned or decorative edging and, in a particularly stiff quality, as belts on plain dresses for teen-agers.


In addition to the typically «novelty» ribbons, the collections contain satin and taffeta ribbons in different colours or brocaded in gold or silver, which are used in the creation of fashion accessories as well as in interior decorating.

Ribbons for the hair loom large among the products of Basle. In addition to the plain ribbons and those with the time-honoured dots, stripes and checks, there have also, since last summer, been others printed with fancy designs and story-book characters, and this type has met with very great success throughout the world.

Some ribbon manufacturers also go in for the manufacture of scarves, with much enthusiasm and skill. As price is of no great importance here, which is not the case with ribbons, the combination of high-priced materials, in delicate shades, and a very sure feeling for design, make it possible to produce some veritable little masterpieces.

Although many rival firms have been set up abroad through the years, the silk ribbon of Basle has succeeded in maintaining its good name thanks to a quality that is always perfect and an exceptionally rich selection.




