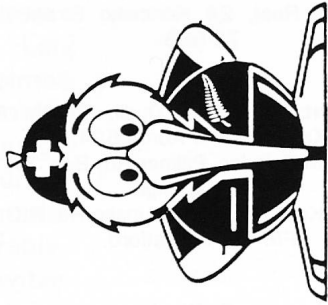

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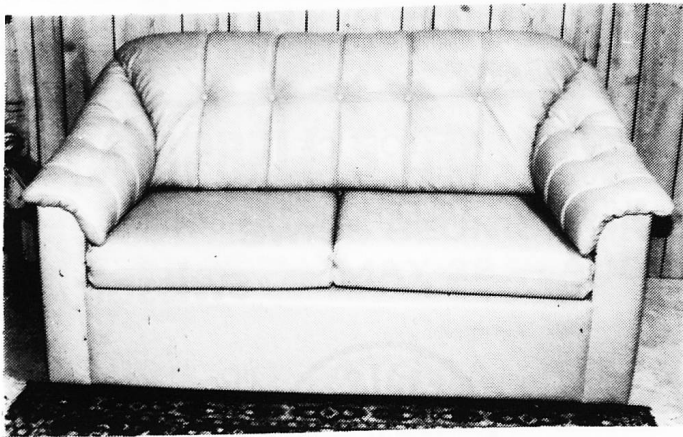

Bath Times

Over the centuries, attitudes to bathing have fluctuated, says Lawrence Wright in his book Clean and Decent. Washing was sometimes believed vital for cleansing the soul and sometimes bad for the skin.

After Saint Benedict's sixth-century command that bathing should "seldom be permitted", people developed an aversion to water. Mixed bathing was forbidden, public baths were declared hotbeds of vice, and all Europe went unwashed. It was the monks, strangely, who were to become the advocates of bathing. Any monk drifting into worldly thoughts had to sit up to his neck in freezing water, while the well-behaved monk was allowed a warm bath.

By the 13th century, some royal bathrooms had fixed baths, tiled floors, bathmats and running water. At London's Westminster Palace in 1275, Robert the Goldsmith was paid 26 shillings and eight pence for "four keys (taps) of gilt bronze and four leopards' head(s) for the baths". Four centuries later, washing was still not held dear by many, but attitudes were beginning to improve. A handful of country mansions had their own water supply. People who were not wealthy faced a brisk wash under a pump in the street.

Towards the end of the last century, sanitation and plumbing were dramatically improving. There was more money about and the bathroom offered a way of impressing friends, as evidence of riches. Everything was made big and solid. Not to be outdone, Queen Victoria had brass taps on her bath at Osborne House that look more capable of operating the boilers of a battleship than merely filling the bath.

Not long ago I received a cookbook from my sister. It is titled "Old Favourites" and gives you 100 recipes grandma used to have.

Green Potato Soup

1 tablespoon butter, melt in pan

1 onion finely chopped

1 clove of garlic

Chives, finely chopped

FRY FOR SHORT WHILE

1 small leek (green parts only)

100gr raw spinach (only leaves)

Cut in small pieces,

add to put and saute.

200g potatoes in cubes, add to veges

1 tablespoon flour, mix in 1 litre of beef stock, bring to boil.

Add pepper and nutmeg.

Boil the soup for 30 minutes, put through strainer (or blender), add

1 dl cream, heat up and serve.

Platzlibratan

600g red meat, cut in ½ cm slices. Fry dark brown on both sides and take out of pan. Salt and pepper to season.

Add 2dl stock to pan and boil for a few minutes.

Put meat alternately with 250gr bacon slices and eight thin slices of bread in shallow gratin dish. Add stock, cover and bake for 45 minutes at 200°C.

Add 2 dl cream and bake for another 15 minutes.

Dessert from the Barbecue

1 banana in skin, fry on light heat until black-skin and put on plate.

Pour 1 teaspoon sugar 1 tablespoon brandy or rum over it and light with match.

When flame dies add vanilla icecream and enjoy it.

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
