AN OLD CUSTOM: FISH CARNIVAL AT ERMATINGEN - March 31.

A small fish, only 4-6 inches long, is a great favourite among the connoisseurs of Ermatingen, a town situated on a branch of Lake Constance. According to tradition, two rival Popes lived at Ermatingen during the famous Church Council of Constance in 1414-18, one of whom, eventually crowned as Pope Martin V, was specially fond of the baked fish, called "Groppen". Wishing to show his appreciation to the populace of Ermatingen when he left the country in 1418, he granted them the privilege of a late Carnival on Laetare-Sunday, which was finally named the "Groppen" Carnival.

Zurich celebrates its ever lovely Sechseläuten Festival on Monday, April 16. This annual event glorifies the passing of Winter and arrival of Spring. The "Bügg", an effigy of Winter, is burned at the stake with quaint ceremonies at six o'clock in the evening. A parade of the ancient guilds precedes this rite, and balls and other gay festivities furnish a grand finale for Winter's retreat. Needless to say, the children, too, come into their own on a special day, and their festival, with cortège and juvenile ball, sparkles with the gladness of youth.
