Dear Compatriots,

**Excerpt from the Rules of the Society—
Paragraph C**

"TO PROVIDE FOR THE MORAL AND FINANCIAL SUPPORT OF SWISS CITIZENS LIVING IN NEW ZEALAND IN URGENT AND DESERVING CASES, IN PARTICULAR TO CARE OR PROVIDE FOR THE NEEDY FAMILIES OF LIVING OR DECEASED SWISS CITIZENS, PROVIDE A DECENT BURIAL AND RESTING PLACE FOR THOSE WHO DIED WITHOUT ADEQUATE MEANS, AND GENERALLY PROVIDE FINANCIAL,

MORAL OR SOCIAL ASSISTANCE IN ANY CASE IN WHICH THE COMMITTEE THINKS FIT, BUT SO THAT NO PERSON CONSIDERED BY THE COMMITTEE AND IN THE EYES OF THE LAW OF NEW ZEALAND OR SWITZERLAND TO BE OF BAD REPUTATION OR AVERSE TO HONEST WORK SHALL RECEIVE ANY ASSISTANCE FROM THE SOCIETY."

Twenty-five years ago in the Spirit of Ruetli and Sempach a handful of Swiss joined together and founded the Swiss Benevolent Society. The above was the principal rule they laid down and when the Swiss Society took over and altered the rules in order to give it more scope it was adopted in full. OBITUARY NOTICE

An old identity of Taranaki, and Hawera in particular, Mr. Albert Schicker, died on Friday, August 2nd, after a heart attack the day before.

Mr. Schicker came to New Zealand as a young lad almost 50 years ago and settled in Taranaki. He went home to Switzerland in 1914, with the intention of getting married and returning to

New Zealand. The war interfered with his plans and he could not return until 1921.

Mr. Schicker lost his first wife in 1935, and later went home once more and married again. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Heidy Schupfer, their son and daughter, and four sons and two daughters by his first marriage.

NOTICES FROM THE CONSULATE

The following Notices could be of interest not only to compatriots who regularly receive the "Helvetia" but also to those who do not receive it, and therefore the Consulate would be grateful if Members of the Swiss Society in New Zealand would kindly inform those of their friends to whom the following Notices could apply.

Swiss Citizenship

The law concerning the acquisition and the loss of the Swiss citizenship of 1952, has now been completed by a new Art. 58 bis. It concerns all women formerly Swiss citizens, who are still married and who, before 1st January, 1953, have lost their Swiss nationality either through marrying a citizen of another State or because they have been included in the renunciation of Swiss citizenship of their husband. All those concerned can now, under certain circumstances, be reintegrated.

The so-called transitory rent (Uebergangsrente) which till now could only be claimed by persons living in Switzerland, can now, under certain conditions, be paid also to Swiss citizens living abroad. Persons eligible are those who could not legally join the A.H.V. in 1948, that is those who have been born before 1st July, 1883, or widows and orphans who have lost their husband or father before 1st December, 1948. As the persons eligible for the transitory rent have never paid a contribution, this benefit is subject to a means test. Under certain circumstances, the "transitory rent" can also be paid to persons who are not only Swiss citizens but who are also nationals of another State (Doppelbuerger).

REMINDER

Swiss citizens do NOT have to renounce their Swiss citizenship in order to become naturalized in New Zealand.
