Mr. Aubaret welcomed about 120 compatriotes present and gave a most inspiring speech. The house was beautifully decorated for the occasion with flags and flowers in our National colours. Mr. Fischbacher made a very artistic Swiss cross of white and red camelias. The supper was delicious and liquor and cigarettes plentiful. A hearty thank-you to Mr. and Mrs. Aubaret for their very generous hospitality.

The "CHILBI" EVENING held by the Swiss Club of Wellington on Saturday, September 27th, was a great success. About 100 people were at one time or another present and amused themselves at the different stands. The Consul-General and Mrs. P-H. Aubaret as well as the Vice-Consul Mr. W. Sollberger honoured the event with their presence.

As was to be expected, the biggest queue was waiting at the "Schiesstand," very ably constructed and looked after by Messrs Fred Fluhler and Joe Hangartner. To make it more difficult and to distract the eye, the darts were put on a background of title pages of the "Nebelspalter." The prizes for the best shots were very nice indeed, and there were quite a number of consolation prizes too. Mr. Hans Gamperle proved to be the winner of the competition and could take away with him a huge sausage. The best rifle-woman was Miss Lotti Hess who was the happy recipient of a bottle of Vermouth. The youngest competitor was Olivier Aubaret and taking his age into consideration he shot so surprisingly well that he too was rewarded with one of the big prizes.

After farming in Taranaki they moved to the Waikato, Te Aroha, in 1911 and from there to Springdale in 1920. They worked very hard and reared a big family of 5 sons and 2 daughters of whom the youngest son Morris died in younger years. There are 32 grand-

children and 2 great-grandchildren. In 1939 Mr. and Mrs. Werder went home to Switzerland for a well-earned holiday. Unfortunately the war interfered then with their plans and forced them to return to New Zealand sooner than expected. Mr. Joe Werder died in 1952. —W.R.

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"ZWIEBELWAHE"

2lbs. onions chopped finely and fried in fat until golden and semi transparent. Cool somewhat then mix with 3 eggs and 1 small teacup of cream and salt.

Line a flat baking dish with puff pastry. Place onion mixture on pastry, but it must not be higher than 1½ inches.

Cover all with slices of lean bacon. Bake in fairly hot oven. Serve hot. —H.B.

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News from Switzerland

MEAT CONSUMPTION IN SWITZERLAND

According to a report issued by the Swiss Butchers' Union, meat consumption in Switzerland during 1957, home slaughtering included, amounted to approximately 101 lb. per inhabitant, representing an increase of some 4½lbs., or 4.4% over the preceeding year. The consumption of poultry doubled, that of veal remained unchanged and that of beef decreased slightly. If home produced meat, fish and the private breeding of poultry and rabbits are included, the consumption per inhabitant in 1957 was just over 1 British cwt., (112lb.).

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DAIRY AND AGRICULTURAL EXHIBITION AT ST-GALL

From the 9th to the 19th of October this year, a dairy and agricultural exhibition, under the name of OLMA, will be held at St-Gall in Eastern Switzerland. This year's exhibition will include a special display of large and small livestock from the canton of Appenzell. It should be mentioned that Eastern Switzerland, which is well known in foreign countries for its textile products, also possesses a flourishing agriculture specialising mainly in dairy farming and fruit growing.

EXCEPTIONAL TRANSPORT OPERATION CARRIED OUT BY THE SWISS FEDERAL RAILWAYS

Among the number of unusual jobs carried out by the Swiss Federal Railways during the first 6 months of this year must be mentioned the carriage of a turbine measuring over 13 feet in diameter and weighing 190 tons, from Munchenstein near Basel in Switzerland, to Kalundborg in Denmark, for installation in a heating plant there. This enormous turbine was transported on a special 36wheeled flatcar of the Swiss Federal Railways.

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SUCCESS OF THE SWISS PAVILION AT BRUSSELS

It is estimated from data gathered in July that between 10 and 12% of all visitors of the Brussels World's Fair visit the Swiss pavilion. The press of visitors varies from day to day, with an approximate daily average of between 15,000 and 18,000. The tourist department, which is seen by most of these visitors, answers an average of 1800 enquiries per day.

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SWISS INDEX OF PRICES

The Swiss index of wholesale prices, which encompasses the most important unprocessed foodstuffs and the chief raw materials and other basic commodities, at the end of June 58 stood at 215.2 (August 1939—100). The level of 0.6% below the preceeding month. The index of consumers' prices at the end of July was 182.4 (also based on August 39—100), thus showing no change over June, although there was a rise of 2.2% compared to the figure for the same month of last year.

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SWISS LOAN SOCIETIES IN SWITZERLAND DURING 1957

According to the report of the union of Swiss loan societies, the so-called Raiffeisen system, that branch of the Swiss banking system has developed favourably in 1957. At the end of last year the number of Raiffeisen agencies was 1040, with a total of 117,000 members. The total balance of all the affiliated societies came to over 1½ billion Swiss francs (U.S.A. \$ 350,000 million), 83 millions (U.S.A. \$ 19.4 million) more than in 1956.

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SWITZERLAND AT BRUSSELS' FAIR

The famous "Atomium," at the World's Fair in Brussels, was able to welcome its millionth visitor, last month. The lift, which had been conceived and realised by a Swiss firm, and which carries curious visitors to the top of this building, at 330 feet above the ground, has also recorded the same number of visitors. In consequence, it has carried a total load of about 160,000 tons and covered a distance of 11,185 miles.
