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In our days, in our eyes, the Swiss flag is something still more. It is the dazzling symbol of national unity, a unity realised in spite of the greatest obstacles, in spite of the diversity of races, of languages, of religion, upon the basis of democracy by the conscious will of populations animated by the same ideal.

From this flag of a little nation born of the spontaneous union of twenty-two Republics, there sprang into life the neutralised international flag which extends its protecting folds over the work of the Red Cross. The plenipotentiaries of thirty-five States who gathered on July 6th, 1906, for the revision of the Geneva Convention wished to state it in these terms: "In homage to Switzerland the heraldic sign of the Red Cross upon a white ground, formed by inversion of the Federal colours, is now maintained as a distinctive emblem of sanatory service in armies."

This nation, ancient by reason of its history, is modern in its aspirations.

Its flag is resplendent as the banner of the victors of Morgarten, first victory of liberty in the Middle Ages. One might say that this flag symbolises the whole national life of our people: their thirst for independence, their ideal of justice and Christian brotherhood; their "raison d'être" in Europe. When it passes at the head of our battalions everyone must take off his hat to it. It is six centuries of liberty passing by.



CHEESE SALAD

This is most popular with Swiss males, when served with white wine (dry) or beer.

1lb Guyere cheese. Cut this up into fine slivers. Make a savoury dressing out of the following ingredients: 1 table-spoon mustard (don't use the mustard powder as it is too strong, but either French's or tube mustard), 1 raw egg, finely cut up onions and garlic to taste, salt, 1½ lemons (juice of), a little paprika or cayenne pepper, caraway seed (Kuemel). Mix these ingredients and blend well. Pour over cheese and let draw for an hour or two before serving.

NEWS FROM SWITZERLAND*SWISS ACHIEVEMENT IN THE HIMALAYAS*

A Swiss expedition has just conquered the summit, inviolate until now, of the Dhaulagiri, the second highest peak in the world (27,000ft). On this occasion, it is only right to mention the services rendered to the expedition by the Swiss aircraft "Pilatus Porter," which, prior to the accident which made it useless, carried out all the transport for the expedition in a remarkable manner. In effect, this aircraft, which had been christened "Yeti," succeeded in accomplishing 25 landings at an altitude of 15,800 feet, on the Tambush Col, and 18 landings on the North-East Col, at an altitude of 17,400 feet, thus, not only establishing a record for landings at high altitude, but also rendering appreciable services as a means of transport, of liaison and of reconnaissance.

FIRST JET OF THE SWISS AIR FLEET

The Swiss national airline company, "Swissair," has just taken delivery, in California, of a Douglas DC-8 aircraft, which will be the first jet plane to be put into service in the Swiss commercial air fleet. The new jet aircraft arrived at Kloten-Zurich after having accomplished the flight between New York and Zurich in 7 hours and 26 minutes.

100,000TH TELEVISION LISTENER

The one hundred thousandth television licence holder has just been registered in Switzerland! This is an advance of 21 months on the estimates made three years ago in respect of the development of television. The first licence for TV was issued in September, 1952; in December, 1958, there were 50,000 licence holders, a figure which has now doubled in less than a year and a half.
