CHRISTMAS MEETING

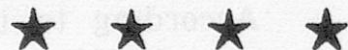

NEWS FROM SWITZERLAND ★ ★ ★

OVER A MILLION MOTOR VEHICLES

Between October 1st, 1961 and September 30th, 1962, the number of motor vehicles licensed in Switzerland exceeded the million mark. This number includes 747,300 private cars, utility vans and trucks and 380,400 two-wheeled motorised vehicles.

On September 30th, 1962, there were 677,400 private cars in Switzerland, representing an increase of 15 per cent during the period under examination (OSEC).

MOTORISATION OF AGRICULTURE

According to the Swiss Association of Tractor Owners, there are over 60,000 tractors in Switzerland at the present moment, the number of these machines having risen from 49,000 in 1960 to 58,000 in 1962. Over 60 per cent of these tractors are of Swiss make, 11 per cent come from the United States of America, while Germany and Great Britain have supplied slightly less. In 1963, the Swiss Association of tractor owners numbered over 33,000 members. (OSEC)
