SILVAPLANA

The following extracts are taken from an article which appeared in the Taranaki Daily News on May 20th, 1968:

CONDENSATE PIPE ON SWISS SHIP

“Over 800 tons of pipe for the Shell and B.P. Pipeline Services Ltd's 33-mile pipeline, which will carry condensate from the Kapuni field to New Plymouth, arrived at Port Taranaki on Saturday.

. . . The pipe is aboard the 10,780-ton Silvaplana, which is only the second Swiss-registered vessel ever to call at the port.

Mural

. . . Silvaplana is the name of a Swiss lake high in the Grison mountains, and the ship has an unusual wooden mural on the wall of the officer's mess, which depicts this lake, using the natural grain of different types of trees. The ship's captain, Mr Robert

Von Arx, said this had been made by Susy Noesch, a Swiss artist, and fitted when the ship was launched 12 years ago.”

While berthed at Port Taranaki for nearly a week, the officers and several of the crew members were shown around Taranaki by our President, Mr Len Chamberlain.

Mr Chamberlain took a carload around Taranaki daily, but due to the traditional Swiss hospitality and the seamen having to report back to the ship at 5 p.m., it was not possible to visit more than three or four homes in a day, and thus many homes unfortunately could not be visited.

Homes and farms to which visits were made were those of Messrs J. Steiner, J. Wuetrich (New Plymouth), A. Schicker (Okato), J. Fohn (Mangorei), J. Riebli (Warea), J. Kuriger (Oaonui), E. Steiner (Tikorangi), O. Steiner (Kapuni), C. Schuler (Kapinga) and A. Kalin (Hawera). Visits were also made to the Club's shooting range on Mr J. Napflin's farm and Kapuni natural gas fields.

On the Thursday evening the officers entertained Swiss people from throughout Taranaki to a party on board the ship which extended into the early hours of the morning. Musical entertainment was provided by one of our accomplished accordionists, Mr J. Fohn. A very enjoyable evening was had by all.

The seamen remarked on the beauty of Mt. Egmont and surrounding countryside and the nice homes of the Swiss people. Several indicated their intention of coming to live in New Zealand permanently. (Of a crew of 34, 25 were Swiss). —R.W.

FIRST PRIZE WINNER

Mrs L. Rufer has won first prize with her recipe 'Basler Laeckerli'. The contest for the best recipe, using honey, was run in conjunction with the Waikato Beekeepers' stall and the Honey Marketing Authority at the recent Waikato Winter Show. The entries, 250 of them, were judged by a panel of home science teachers, who pronounced Mrs Rufer's recipe the most balanced.

It was pointed out by the panel, that merely substituting sugar with honey often showed a lack of blend and/or a clash of taste. Mrs Rufer's prize consists in a sizable quantity of honey, delivered to her home. Herewith the prizewinning recipe.—

Basler Laekerli:

1½ lb flour, ½ lb sugar, ½ lb honey, 1 level teaspoon cinnamon ground, 1 level teaspoon cloves ground, little nutmeg, ½ cup milk, ½ cup mixed peel, finely chopped; 3 oz almonds, chopped; 3 oz hazelnuts or walnuts, chopped; few drops rum aroma or Kirsch, 1 teaspoon baking soda, some icing sugar.

Method: Bring honey and sugar to boil, then add milk and mix well. Take it from the pan, mix with the flour and other ingredients which you have ready in a bowl. At last, add the baking soda, which you have dissolved in a little warm water. Knead the dough and leave it to rest for three to four hours.

Roll pieces quarter inch thick, put them on a greased and floured tray, brush with sugar water and bake 12 to 15 minutes at 350 degrees. When still hot, cut into two-inch squares and ice with icing sugar which contains a few drops of rum aroma. This biscuit will keep for months in airtight tins.
