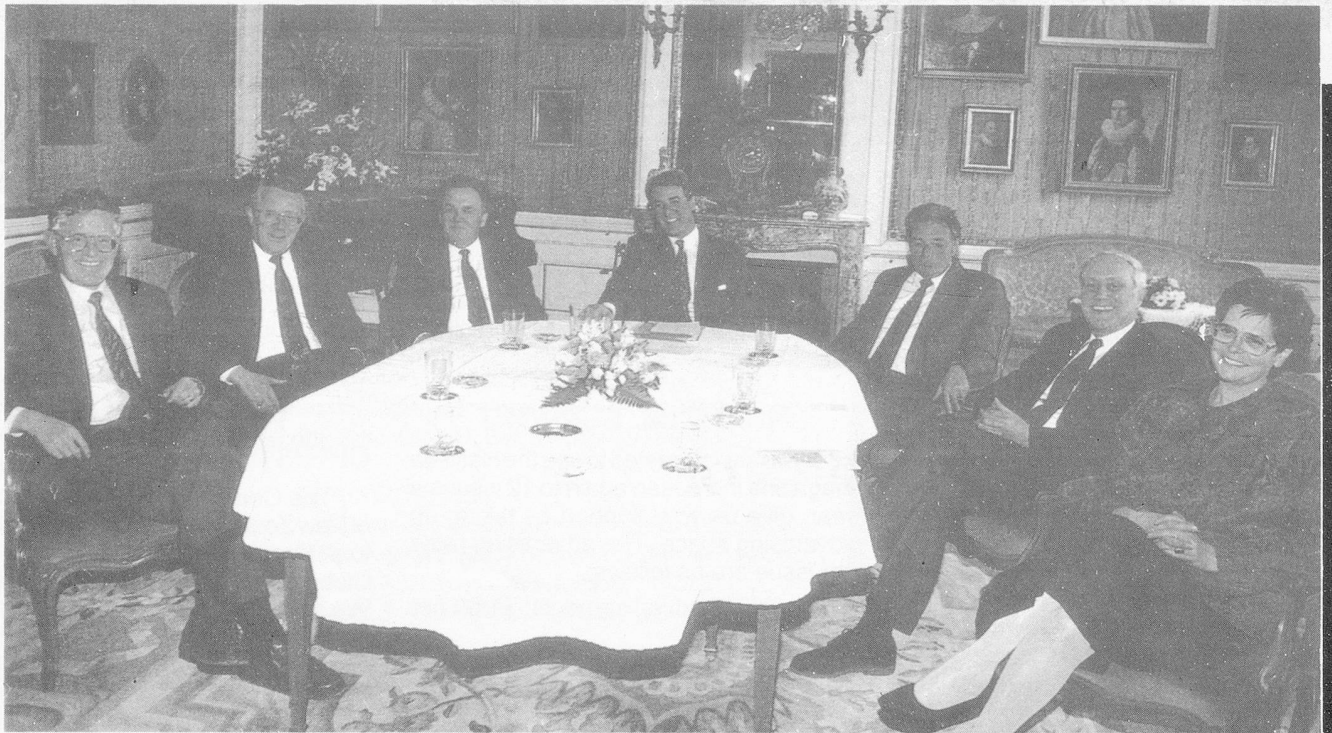
## NEW FEDERAL COUNCILLOR

### SIMPLON LINE EXTENSION

The last 4.6 km of single track line between Salgesch and Leuk (Wallis) will be doubled up before the year 2000. The new railway line will be built through a tunnel so that the space that becomes available can be used for a new road.

### FARMERS' INCOME

The revenues from farming in Switzerland have shrunk by 6000 SFR or 8% per farm last year. The main reasons were the combined effect of increases in production costs and price reduction of farm goods on the market. The average loss in revenue is therefore around 18 SFR per day and per farm worker.

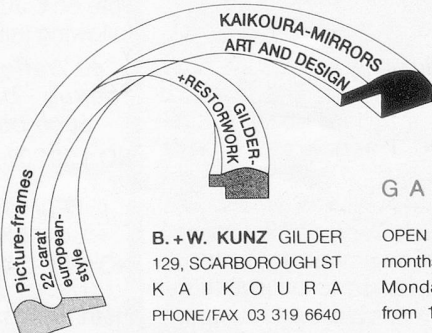
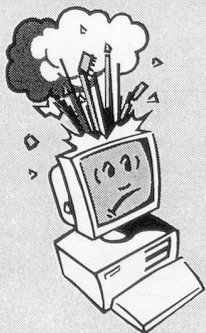
