## CHARTER PASSENGERS ON SCHEDULED FLIGHTS

Very quietly the Swiss Civil Aviation Department has changed the rules governing charter flights. In the past, charter flights were strictly regulated: all passengers had to travel together, there and back, with no change of airlines, return dates or place of return.

The new regulations allow charter passengers almost as much freedom as normal paying passengers. They can change their return dates, return from a different city than the one they flew to, even change airlines for the return journey. These new regulations allow more interchange between Balair and Swissair on international flights to the delight of both Swiss airlines.


Strangely enough, these regulations are in direct contrast to the new European rules which practically abolished charter flight operations as from January 1, 1994.

### MAMMOTH BOOK STORE






# BOY SCOUTS WORRY ABOUT THEIR CAMPING GROUNDS
