## **Swissair with Heart**

Swissair is equipping all its aircraft with new life-saving devices. Flight crews are being trained to use heart defibrillators. The machines are designed to re-establish a regular heart beat after a passenger has suffered a cardiac arrest.

Some United States and European airlines already have the devices on board their aircraft.



**Airport Kloten/Zürich:** Major plans have been announced to expand the country's largest airport - Zurich-Kloten, once its privatisation is approved. The head of the planned airport corporation, Josef Felder, said he expected turnover to rise to one billion Francs by 2003 - double its current level.

Mr Felder said he believed another five hundred jobs would be created at the airport.

And he said he would press for alliances and agreements with other airports around the worldwide.

Kloten's privatisation still needs to be approved by the cantonal parliament and in a local vote.

#### New Elephants for Basel

Three baby elephants have arrived under police escort at their new home at the Basel zoo in January. Zoo officials said the journey had gone off without any problems. The animals flew in from South Africa to their stopover in the German city of Leipzig on Thursday. Their trip was delayed because of protests from animal rights activists. The three new arrivals will now spend between three and six weeks in guarantine.

#### **More History Uncovered**

A Gallic-Roman theatre dating from the first or second century A-D has been unearthed in the city of Lausanne.

Local authorities said it was discovered at a construction site near the shore of Lake Geneva.

They said it was not yet possible to tell how large it is since the main seating area is hidden beneath a road.

It's the fourth theatre of its kind to be found in Switzerland.

### Rules on Medical Transplants to Be Part of Constitution

At present, various Swiss cantons have their own regulations governing medical transplant practices; these laws are not only varied, they are sometimes mutually contradictory. Some cantons have no such regulations at all. Given the growing importance of transplant technology, the situation calls for regulation on the national level, as is the case in almost all other European countries.

Consequently, the text of a new constitutional article was made public this week 18/01/99, which the Federal Council and Parliament are placing before voters in a referendum scheduled for 7 February. The article lays down guidelines for organ, tissue and cell transplants and establishes the chain of authority in cases of xenotransplants" (i.e., transplants of animal organs into humans). It also calls for equal treatment of patients, which is of particular importance in view of the shortage of transplant organs. In this connection, the new constitutional article is designed to hinder commercialization of transplants by requiring human organ donations to be gratis and banning all trade in such organs.






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# Heavy Tourist Rush in Winter Resorts

Swiss winter sports resorts were pleased with business during the holiday season; vacant hotel beds were a rare commodity. In Arosa (Grisons), some quests had to be put up on mattresses in sauna rooms. Rentals of vacation apartments were also gratifying. As a result, ski slopes, mountain railways and cablecars were crowded. In Engelberg (Central Switzerland), waiting periods had to be instituted because there were too many people on the slopes. Snow conditions, however, were rather less than ideal. Most long valley runs are closed for lack of snow, and everywhere in the Alps people are anxiously awaiting new snowfalls.
