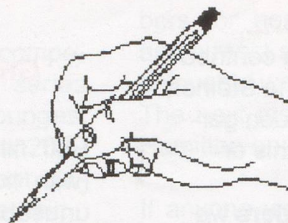

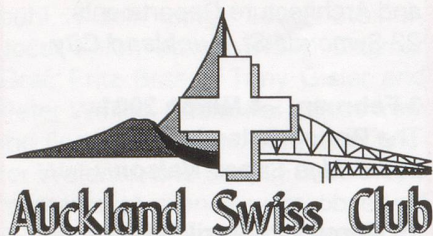

year. After a lovely lunch and a nice 'cuppa', the afternoon commenced, with the opening of the AGM of the Swiss Society!

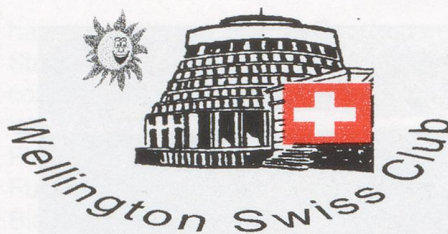
President, Beatrice Leuenberger, first introduced to all of us our new Ambassador Mrs. Silvie Matteucci-Keller!
