Answers to Quiz Questions:

For everyone else who attempted the Quiz on Switzerland, here are the answers to all the questions -

- 1) The Helvetic Confederation, formed in 1291, is 709 years old.
- 2) The population of Switzerland is approx. seven million.
- 3) 18 year old Swiss were given the right to vote in federal elections in March, 1991. (previously 20 years)
- 4) There are 26 cantons and half cantons in Swizerland.
- 5) The current 'Bundespräsident' is Adolf Ogi.
- 6) Five countries boarder with Switzerland - France, Austria, Italy, Germany and Liechtenstein.

- 7) Switzerland has four official national languages - French, Italian, German (Swiss) and Romansch.
- 8) The highest mountain peak in Switzerland is the Dufour Peak, at 4,634 meters.
- 9) The highest village is Juf (GR), at 2126 meters.
- 10) The lowest lying town is Ascona (Tessin) at only 196 meters.
- 11) The capital city of Switzerland is Berne. The city is famous for its bears and named after its bears.
- 12) Zürich is the largest and most populated city in Switzerland.
- The longest river flowing through Switzerland is the Rhine.
- 14) The Swatch watch originated in Biel-Bienne (by Nicholas Hayek)
- 15) The main ingredient for Fondue is Cheese.
- 16) Cabbages are used to make Sauerkraut.
- 17) The author of the 'Heidi' story is Johanna Spyri.
- 18) Ten bridges span the River Reuss in Luzern, and the most well known bridge is "Kappelbrücke".
- 19) The capital of Canton Uri is Altdorf, where the William Tell monument is to be found.
- 20) The Glacier Express is one of the most impressive railway routes in Switzerland.

Christmas is nearly here, which means baking time for many of us. The traditional "Grittibänz", made with "Zopf" dough, is still a popular favourite in Switzerland. It is very easy to prepare, and fun for children to help make and decorate.

Grittibänz

1 kg white flour 3 tsp salt 40 gr yeast 5 1/2 dl milk 1 egg (beaten)

120 gr butter or margarine

1 egg yolk to brush Mr or Mrs Bänz Sultanas for eyes, buttons, etc.

Disolve the yeast in some of the (lukewarm) milk, and then mix all the ingredients together. Knead into a dough, cover, and leave overnight. Divide dough into equal sized portions for the number of "Bänze" needed. Form a body, head, arms and legs for each, wetting the smaller pieces to stick to the body. Decorate using sultanas and brush with egg yolk. Bake in the middle of oven at 200°C for approx. 25 mins.
