Dear members,

I trust you are all coming to the AGM this coming Saturday, May 4th, 4 pm, at the farm.

The opportunity is there again for all those who havn't had a turn at running this club.

I came close to handing over the 'writing-job', but on consideration I realised that I hadn't quite finished with the objectives I had wanted to work on, one of which being to walk along the boundaries of the farm and get an idea of how big it is and what we have there.

I did it on Saturday 13 April, with Heinz and Thomas Matysik.

Heinz knows where every peg is or should be, and is overseeing the pine plantation programme on the club's behalf. He introduced me to our prominent neighbour with whom we have the good fortune to be able to combine the clearing, planting, pruning and felling of the trees and thus making sure we get the full benefit of our investment. Groome is a very notable and extremely knowledgeable forestry consultant. He proudly showed us his plantation including a patch of native bush through which he is establishing a blind track and other attractions as well as his RAM pump, before we could set out on our walk. - It is a 21/2 hour trek, with beautiful views toward the Kaipara Harbour in the west and the Waitemata to the east. There are some beautiful stands of native bush in the second and third blocks, and the path back through the (north-eastern) neighbour's land took us past some charming landscape where the goats also seem to love it, down into an almost entirely closed-circle "kettle" surrounded by steep bush covered banks of the old guarry - from which one can haul oneself via rope back up and over to the club's property. From there we crossed through Tim's farm, (the farmer who keeps the grass down with his grazing cattle) and came back at the top of the carpark. The long walk left me tired but full of happiness and gratitude for being granted temporary part ownership (by way of membership to the club) of such a tranquil piece of paradise.

- I believe that no member should leave the club without having done that walk at least once.

Anna Louisa Lischer 3.5.1919 - 12.3.2002





Annelies Lischer née Willimann was born on 3. May 1919 in Littau, Canton Luzern. She was the youngest of the seven children in the Willimann family. During her early adult years in Switzerland she lived on her brother's farm at Malters, near Luzern, where she undertook seasonal work in local Hotels. She then spent one year in England, working and learning the language. In 1952 she met her future husband Ted Lischer. Ted emigrated to New Zealand in 1953 and Annelies followed in 1955, arriving on March 14, (the date of Annelies's funeral 47 years later) and they were married at the Catholic Church in Morrinsville in April 1955.

Annelies and Ted's marriage was blessed with three daughters and one son. Their farming life started with sharemilking at Tauhei and progressed to farm ownership at Manawaru.

The 47 years of happy marriage of Annelies and Ted were unfortunately overshadowed by the tragic loss of one daughter due to an accident and of a second daughter due to illness.

A keen follower of bowls and golf, Annelies found much friendship and happiness in her circle of sporting friends at Te Aroha.


Snippets and News from Switzerland

Swiss have a sweet tooth

Chocolate consumption has increased to a record annual 12.3kg per head of population. The Swiss are the undisputed champions in chocolate eating - Germany comes a distant second at 10kg. Chocolate manufacturers last year produced a record 141,243 tonnes of this tasty confectionery - up 2.1% from the previous year - bringing in Fr.1.28 billion (approx. \$1.8 billion).

Together with imports, the Swiss munched their way through no less than 89,109t of chocolate in total. Best sellers continue to be the time honoured Easter bunnies, chocolate eggs and Christmas decorations, accounting for 11.9% of production. Even the sale of the chocolate bars (Tafeln) increased by 7.1%. New creations are said to be primarily responsible for this improvement the bar section alone created 90 new products last year.

Exports have increased even more than inland consumption to 66,041t - although sales did drop sharply after September 11th.



Chocosuisse continues to enjoy a very good name throughout the world, no doubt supported by clever marketing. Of the 130 countries Chocosuisse counts as customers, Germany accounts for 25% of total sales, followed by Britain, 11%; France, 10%; and USA, 6%.

Swissport finally sold

Swissair has sold its dispatch company, Swissport, to the British investment firm, Candover, for Fr. 580m (approx. \$803m). No redundancies are anticipated.

Candover is investing Fr.274m of its own capital, and five trading banks another Fr.345m. Transfer costs will be about Fr.39m. Swissport is satisfied with the arrangements. The new firm will continue to pursue an aggressive expansion policy. Candover will fully support the world's second largest dispatch company and does not see the investment as a short term profit oriented venture. Swissport is active at 130 airports in 23 countries and is well positioned
