Editorial

Howling winds and rain in the north of our country at first with more wind damage on this round! The flooding hit there a year later, just a couple of weeks ago! Meantime, last year, the centre-west of the North Island, from Waikato to Horowhenua districts, was spared the worst of winter storms and deluges although most districts in these areas got their fair share of winter and spring rains.
