Joseph (Joe) Kaiser was born at Manaia on 8th June, 1928. He had an older sister, Josephina (Josie). At the age of five years he started school and it was then that he started to learn the English language, as at that time he was a fluent speaker in the Swiss Dialect which he spoke all his life.

As a teenager of thirteen years his parents bought a bicycle, so he could get home quicker from school to milk the cows and so started his Dairy Farming career which he continued for 64 years.

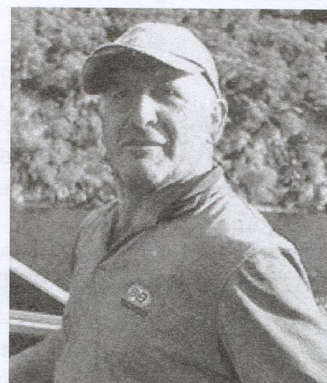
In his early twenties Archery was his sport, then small bore shooting at Eltham. Being a keen outdoor person, Joe took up Deer and Pig Hunting, as well as target shooting. Joe won many trophies and medals while travelling all round the North Island to participate in his sport. During this time fishing was always a keen interest. Joe was always looking at Mt Egmont and eventually climbed to the summit with friends, many times between milking the cows, during the day.

Later at 39 years of age, he married Nita Ehrler and they were blessed with five sons: Peter, Ronald, Neil, Bryce and Josef, and six grandchildren. During this time, Joe became a keen gardener, growing anything that was food for his family; vegetables and many kinds of fruit. If he did not have it, a graft was put on an established tree and mostly they grew. As the saying goes: "he had green fingers".

Joe and Nita visited Switzerland many times in later life and met many cousins in Canton Nidwalden. In 1952 Joe was one of the Foundation Members of the Swiss Social Club Incorporated (Taranaki Swiss Club), something he was very proud of. To Joe his Swiss Heritage was very important and he always enjoyed the Swiss Club days and evenings. At the Taranaki Swiss Club, Joe actively participated in the small bore and karabiner shooting activities, achieving great results in both. Joe, together with Nita, made and donated the Sauerkraut for the annual Anniversary Shoot; it was truly delicious and enjoyed by many of our members. Joe and Nita appreciated being part of several trips away with the Swiss Club, and enjoyed themselves immensely.
