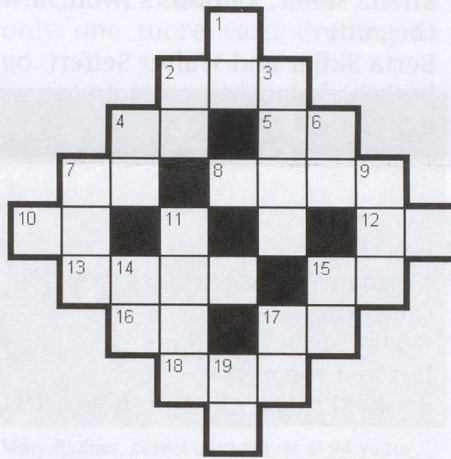

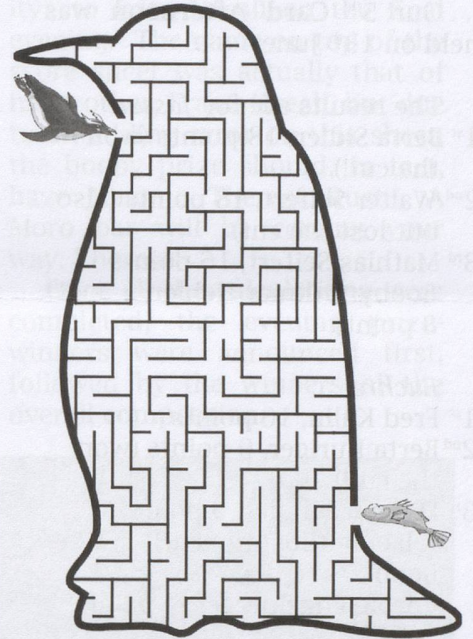

# Digestion facts
