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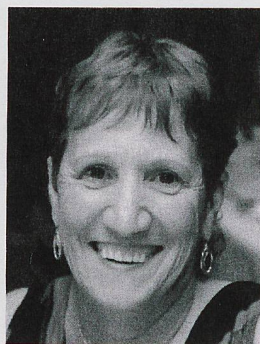
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Obituaries

They were young, brave and adventurous, spoke little or no English and knew very little about where they were heading.

Her mother, Rosa, was engaged to Frank and followed him to New Zealand a couple of years later. She was in her teens and left behind her parents and three sisters; she never saw her mother again and saw her sisters only once.

Freda was born in 1936 and was raised on the family farm on Bird Road, Stratford. She and her brothers attended Bird Road School and the Nolly clan spent much time together. When Freda finished high school she got a job at the Stratford Shoe Store. It was here she first met Colin – tall, dark, handsome, genuine and dependable. Freda was genuine Swiss, superbly crafted and Colin was a man who appreciated quality and precision. They married in 1958 and settled on the Wilson family farm in Mahoe (just out of Stratford). They

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made life-long friends in the Mahoe community and joined various clubs and organisations in the district. Freda was very proud of her Swiss heritage and they were members of the Taranaki Swiss Club for many years. She read every issue of the Helvetia magazine from cover to cover! They attended many Swiss dances and both Colin and Freda loved dancing. They were blessed with two daughters, Maree and Sheryl.

The Wilson's was an open house – everyone was welcome, at any time of day. They provided great hospitality and food was Freda's forte. They loved music, cards and pool. Freda loved people and enjoyed a chat, cared for others, was correct but friendly, conservative and frugal.
