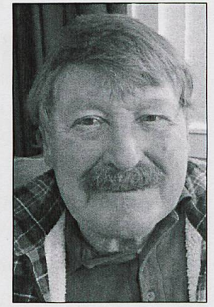


VICE PRESIDENT:

Hello, my name is Marianne (daughter of Ruedi and Lisette Benkert) and I will be the Society's new treasurer.



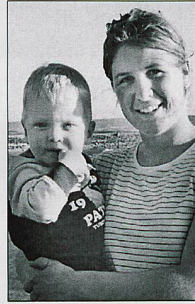

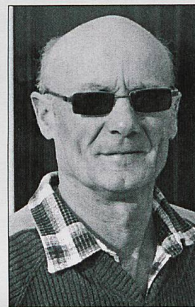


I have been a part of the Taranaki Swiss Club for as long as I can remember and recently took on a role in the committee.

I was born in Switzerland many moons ago, in Brugg, Aargau. After high school, I went to teachers' training college.



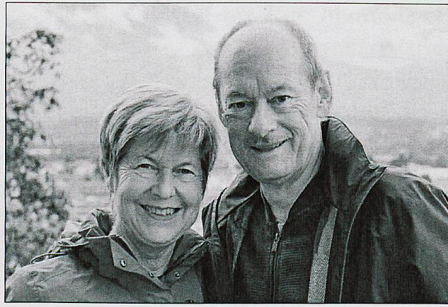

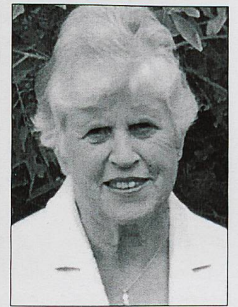
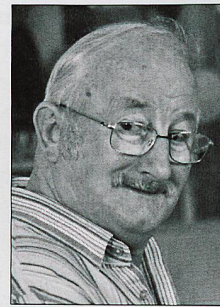
Richard then worked as a full-time pilot for The Kingdom of Tonga, and then Fiji where they frequently visited the outer islands.
