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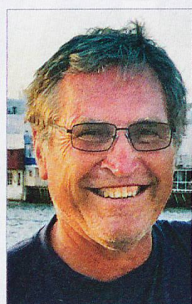
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From the President

So, as you can see, the Swiss Club, for me, has always been very important and I aim to foster the Swiss culture and traditions and promote them to our future generations.
