The Basel [plug.in] lends itself particularly well to our new approach: one of its main aims is to expose visitors to the new media's manifold possibilities in a particularly user-friendly atmosphere, while at the same time offering artists who resort to digital tools a chance to present their ideas and projects through the Forum.

We take advantage of these lines to extend our warmest thanks to Annette for putting her heart and soul into this issue, and for our enjoyable and most profitable teamwork with her. In the hopes that the resulting issue of "Swiss Art" meets the needs and interests of our readers, we wish you all good reading.
