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ITEMS OF INTEREST.

At the request of the Swiss Government the Marconi Company have again installed a temporary wireless installation for the duration of the present session of the League of Nations.

The transmitting station is erected at Borno and is automatically operated from a room in the League of Nations building in Geneva, establishing wireless communication with England and several other European countries.

Mr. McCormick, formerly operator on the Lusitania, who was on duty when the vessel was torpedoed, is included in the staff of experts who conduct the wireless service.

According to the Chinese Government Bureau of Economic Information there are established in China four Swiss firms with a personnel of 632.

Messrs. Müller-Staub Fils, of Zurich, who have claimed £10,000 damages from Messrs. M'Bride & Williams, of Belfast; for breach of contracts made during 1915 for delivery of large quantities of handkerchiefs, obtained in the Belfast Courts a verdict for £9,500 against the Belfast merchants.

The judgment, which was delivered by the Right Hon. Mr. Justice Moore, is very important and highly interesting in connection with trading under War Legislation.

Our compatriot and athlete H. Nozières won the 100 Yards Scratch Race at Polton (Bedford) in 9 4/5 seconds, equalling the English record. At Yarmouth he was victor in the 220 Yards Scratch in 22 3/5 seconds, and at Liverpool in the 100 Yards Scratch in 10 1/5 seconds.
