Notice was given that several letters of request for paying due subscriptions had been returned or gnored. The Secretary was asked to follow them up and to report the results. *Correspondence.*—A letter from Mr. H. Martin was read in which he expressed his thanks to the Society for their vote of apprecia ion.—Dr. Lang, Secretary of the N.S.H., requested the S.M.S. to send all the documents available, such as charts, reports, etc., to be exhibited at the Basle Samples Fair, showing the activities of the Swiss abroad. Unfortunately, our Society will not be able to send much, but care will be taken to supply all particular, especially those 'concerning the Educational Department.
