## The Charitable Disposition of the Swiss Colony in London.

The London Secretariat of the Nouvelle Société Helvétique has compiled statistics showing the approximate annual amount which is contributed by the members of the London Swiss Colony for the upkeep of the societies and benevolent institutions in our Colony. The following figures have been extracted from the official reports and other documents:—

For administration, instructing, social and entertaining activities ... about	£3450
For education and national propaganda ..	£1350
For the Church and its activities ... ..	£1050
For the poor, aged and sick ... ..	£2525
For Swiss House for governesses ... ..	£ 100
For Sport purposes ... ..	£ 150
For donations sent to Switzerland ... ..	£ 100

It should be noted that the above do not include subscriptions and donations to British institutions and charities, nor amounts forwarded to Switzerland for similar objects.

## LA NOUVELLE SOCIÉTÉ HELVÉTIQUE.

(Communicated.)

MEETING OF THE COUNCIL  
January 17th, 1923.

1. Two candidates were admitted as members, and there were two resignations.

2. The Treasurer's report was agreed to. The balance for 1923 is far more satisfactory than was expected some time ago.

3. A letter from a Zurich Choral Society, regarding a trip to England in 1924 or 1925 and asking how the Swiss Colony would welcome such a scheme, was discussed.

4. The arrangements regarding the April lantern lecture by Professor Zschokke were discussed. The March lecture will be given by the Rev. Hoffmann-de Visme at 28, Red Lion Square.

5. The question was discussed in principle whether we ought to transfer our office to the "Foyer Suisse." It was finally decided that the discussion should be postponed until the report of the delegation, which is going to inspect the premises, had been submitted.

6. A number of Councillors undertook to call personally upon certain members who had not replied to our communication, with regard to their future membership.

7. The Secretary made a few communications with regard to his activity: (a) his article on the political events of 1922 to the Annual Register has been despatched; (b) he published in "The Times" a reply to an article about the discussion on the Swiss General's report in the National Council, clearing up a certain misunderstanding; (c) "The Anglo-Swiss Review" was reported to have gone bankrupt; (d) the Swiss Sub-Committee to the League of Nations had its inaugural meeting on the 17th of January. The Bureau is composed of—Mr. F. J. Borsinger, Chargé d'Affaires, President; Mr. E. Buser, Vice-President; Dr. Paul Lang, Secretary. The League of Nations Union plans to have an international Art Exhibition in the Royal Academy in December, 1923. This would be carried through with the assistance of the national Sub-Committees. An even wider plan is that of a World Exhibition, to be held in London in 1924 or 1925, which is also under consideration of the Union; (e) the Secretary had an opportunity of defending unfair attacks on the Swiss hotel industry by correspondence, and he invited the Councillors to let him know when he could do similar work; (f) the "St. Galler Stadtanzeiger" has been reorganised. Its new editor, Mr. Tüng, proposes to edit it on the lines of the former "Neue Schweizer Zeitung." Dr. Schoop is foreign editor. Subscriptions are welcome.

8. A list of sixteen candidates for the Council in 1923 was drafted and will be proposed to the Annual General Meeting, subject to their personal agreement. It was decided that the subscription should be raised to 10s.

9. The President of the Swiss Mercantile Society announced that he had received a donation of 200 fr. on our behalf from a Swiss firm.

Le "Papa Matthey," comme on se permettait de l'appeler, était en effet si paternel! Il s'occupait de vous avec une telle gentillesse. Sa longue expérience d'instituteur l'avait rompu au métier de gardien de la jeunesse. Il avait tenu des classes aux Brenets, à la Seignette et ailleurs dans le canton de Neuchâtel, auquel il était fier d'appartenir, en tant que bourgeois de la Brévine. Et il avait passablement roulé le monde, pilotant des groupes d'élèves à travers l'Allemagne, l'Italie et les Alpes durant des semaines. Puis un beau jour, il s'en était venu sur les rives de la Tamise, il y a de cela 40 ans, et il n'en était jamais plus reparti. Après bien des années à la tête d'une école primaire française dans le quartier étranger il avait voué le reste de ses ans à servir de "papa" à toutes celles qui venaient dans son home, en attendant de trouver des places. Et comme il se devait pour toute sa maisonnée! Tant qu'il put mettre deux pieds l'un devant l'autre, il travailla encore.

Le voilà donc parti pour son repos, après 78 années de vie laborieuse. Il est en paix, délivré de ses maux. Mais pour les siens qui demeurent, quel vide que son départ. Puisse-t-ils trouver ici une expression sincère de la vive sympathie de quel'un qui a bien connu et aimé leur père vénéré.
