more his rhetorical talent. Indeed, for such an important function the Committee of the S.M.S. has to be congratulated upon the choice as Mr. De Brunner outlined in his opening speech with particular ability the necessity for the extensive and comprehensive commercial education of the 'rising generation,' indicating at the same time not only the commercial possibilities and advantages, but showing the invaluable effect of such an education upon the general reputation of Switzerland and the Swiss people. Ex-Minister Director Junod, President of the visiting Society, expressed the satisfaction of the Swiss visitors at the hearty welcome the party had received from the Swiss Colony in London, and emphasized his extreme appreciation of the manner in which everything had been prepared for them by Messrs. Martin, DeBrunner and Pfandler. Director Junod, too, endorsed the Chairman's remarks regarding the absolute necessity for a thorough training of the young Swiss "commerçants." The great applause which followed both speeches left no doubt as to the opinion of the audience.

The evening must have been a pleasure to everybody, and the efforts of the culinary department of the Union Helvetia doubtless contributed appreciably to the humour and high spirit prevailing. At all events, when the orchestra of the Swiss Institute played a potpourri, the audience joined in singing "Min Vater isch en Appzeller-er" and "Im Aargäu sind zwei Liebi."

Mr. Masterman-Smith, addressing the visitors in response to Director Junod's speech, elaborated the working of the Education Department and the magnificent results achieved in the first 18 months, while Mr. Ulr. Bretscher, in his usual most humorous style, explained the "constitution" of the Swiss Colony in London. As a consequence, having regard to the up-to-date constitution and modern institutions which the activity of the colony has bestowed upon itself, we will undoubtedly soon be known at home as the most advanced "dependency" of the noble Lords in Berne! However, in order to obviate any possible misunderstanding, and for "good order's sake," an inaccuracy, or better a "slip in der Hitze des Gefechtes" has to be pointed out, much to the regret of the whole colony, of course, in the speech of Professor Widmer, of Berne, who said: "... jedoch haben Sie keine Steuern." If he only knew!

With much enjoyment we listened to beautiful songs by Mlle. Fletscherin, who admirably rendered "S'Vreneli ab em Guggisberg" and two classical songs. The productions of the double quartette of the Swiss Choral Society and the orchestra of the Swiss Institute were likewise much appreciated. The Committee feels very much indebted for the help which has been freely forthcoming.

At the close of the programme Director Junod once more took the opportunity to thank the Society for a highly enjoyable evening, and presented in his capacity of Inspecteur Fédéral pour l'Enseignement commercial à l'Etranger a 1st class diploma to our active member, Mr. M. W. Gut, who has been awarded this distinction, with bronze medal, by the examiners of the National Union of Teachers.

The audience included, amongst other distinguished visitors, Monsieur Martin, Counsellor of Legation, Dr. Rezzonico, Professor Colonel Borel, Messrs. Barbezat, Schupbach, Rohr, and—last but not least—Mr. J. Geilinger, "still going strong" and being present at every important meeting of the Colony. G.

Following the "Souper familial," as above reported, the party from the "Union Suisse pour l'Enseignement commercial," in turn, invited the committee members of various Swiss clubs to a boat trip to Windsor for last Sunday.

About 96 joined the party on the steam launch "King," departing at 20 minutes past 10 o'clock from Molesey Lock, Hampton Court, and arriving after a very pleasant journey at 4 o'clock in Windsor. On account of the time, only 45 minutes could be spent in viewing the courtyards and terraces of Windsor Castle; the other parts, unfortunately, were not open to the public.

Quite exceptionally for Swiss affairs in London, indicating, however, the earnest desire for remedy, the "King" left Windsor again at 4.45 p.m. sharp, arriving at Hampton Court at 9.15 p.m.

Most of the participants of the 'Souper familial,' referred to above, were present also at this boat trip. The party further included the Swiss Minister and Madame Paravicini. G.

They have all left, and most of them should by now be in the thick of it. Mr. E. Hirt left yesterday afternoon in charge of the Cup from the London Colony, and is also carrying a special letter of felicitation from the Swiss Minister to the "Festkomitee" in Aarau.

The Annual Athletic Sports of the Boy Scouts Association, Wandsworth, Putney and Barnes District, were held at Battersea Park on Saturday last, the 19th of July. At the finish of the Sports there was a presentation of medals to the winners and runners-up of the two football teams competing in the final for the Edwards Football Cup, namely, the 1st Wandsworth Common (winners) and St. Andrew's, Earlsfield (runners-up). The medals were kindly given by P. F. Boehringer, Esq., Editor of *The Swiss Observer*, and G. E. DeBrunner, Esq., President of the Swiss Rifle Association. Lt.-Col. Crane, D.S.O., B.C.C., etc., presented the medals and also presented the Cup at the final match when it was won on the 19th of April last.
