A return visit to the Wandsworth Borough Rifle Club has been arranged for Saturday, Sept. 20th. FETE NATIONALE.

Some 500 Swiss and their friends attended in the evening of July 31st at Caxton Hall, Westminster, the Patriotic Concert arranged by the Swiss Institute in celebration of our National Day, the 1st of August.

As in previous years, Monsieur C. R. Paravicini, our Minister, had again kindly accepted the honorary presidency of this annual gathering, and after an opening piece by the orchestra, he welcomed in a few well-chosen words all those that had assembled to celebrate the 633rd anniversary of the foundation of Switzerland on the Rütli in 1291.

His words of welcome were greatly applauded, and following another piece by the orchestra, Mr. Charles Schubach recited two admirably selected Bernese poems, of which the first in particular, entitled "Schwyzergschicht," was greatly enjoyed by everybody.

He was succeeded by a piano solo by Miss Madeleine Theiler, whose great musical talent the audience very much appreciated.

Pasteur Hoffmann-de Visme in a speech, which space does not permit us to print *in extenso*, dwelt on the patriotic significance of the occasion, the pride which justly lived in the heart of every Swiss in the great history of our country, but also of the heavy duties which this sacred citizenship devolved on every compatriot, particularly those that enjoyed, permanently or temporarily, the hospitality of a foreign land. His words being the vivid expression of a great depth of patriotic thought and feeling, as well as responsibility not lightly conceived towards one's country in particular, and humanity in general, were met with hearty response in the spontaneous applause by the whole assembly when he had finished.

Whilst his inspiring words had awakened everybody's feelings of love, and pride alike, for our little homeland nestled around the highest peaks of the Alps, the truly Swiss atmosphere was created by the series of Swiss songs with which Mlle. Felia Dorio and her little troupe of ladies in national costume delighted all of us, only to be further heightened still by well-known Swiss melodies played subsequently by the orchestra.

Yet unfortunately the hour grew late, but the scene of the first meeting between the Three Confederates from Schiller's "William Tell," recited by three members of the Swiss Y.M.C.A., again earned well-deserved applause and appreciation.

The concert terminated with the singing of the Cantique Suisse by the entire assembly and the playing of the 'Marche Patriotique' followed by the National Anthem by the orchestra.

A number of young ladies, prettily attired in the national garb of various cantons, this year also sold tiny federal and cantonal flags, and together with the proceeds from the sale of the several cushions in the national colours, which were disposed of to the highest bidder, a handsome sum of £38 10s. was realised, enabling the Swiss Institute, after deduction of expenses, to hand over a balance of about £11 to the Swiss Benevolent Society.
