UNION HELVETIA.

39th Annual Banquet and Ball.

The Annual Banquet and Ball of the above Society took place on the 12th November, with the Swiss Minister, Monsieur C. R. Paravicini, in the Chair.

After a summer which has beaten a good many previous years, as far as rain is concerned, thus spoiling a number of outdoor functions which usually are in great favour, the Swiss Colony of London seems to have concentrated its hopes upon the winter season. These hopes had, so far, the effect of tidal waves with regard to attendance, and I imagine that the committees of the various Swiss clubs are confronted more than ever with the serious problem of finding sufficiently large accommodation for their functions.

Such a tidal wave struck also the 39th Annual Banquet and Ball of the Union Helvetia, there being an attendance of about 150 members and friends. Various toasts were proposed: "The King and the Royal Family" by the Swiss Minister, "La Patrie" by Mr. P. Lehrian, "Union Helvetia" by Mr. A. Indermauer, "The Guests" by Mr. J. Emmenegger, "The Ladies" by Mr. A. Wyss.

The Swiss Minister rightly called the attention of the assembly to the fact that within a comparatively short time a good number of toasts had been honoured and speeches delivered, which, indeed, is an unusual feature in any Swiss Club, but nevertheless very welcome. Let us hope that a similar "speed" may prevail at other social gatherings this season.

An unexpected pleasure were two songs by Mr. Cave, who is well known amongst the members of the Union Helvetia. In spite of his imminent departure for India, Mr. Cave had found it possible to contribute to the evening's enjoyment, and it is only to be regretted that his absence from this country will prevent him from attending further functions for a time.

But with the advancing hour the impatience of the younger generation seemed to increase in anticipation of the ball, which started at about 11.30. Permission had been obtained for the ball to continue until 2 a.m., which was very much appreciated, and when I left, the dancing was in full swing.

SWISS BANK FOOTBALL CLUB.

FIRST ELEVEN.

The Swiss Bank 1st XI conceded their first League point on Saturday to Lloyds Bank 4th XI at Lower Sydenham in a scrappy game, the result of which was a draw of one goal each.

There was nothing to enthuse over in the play of the 1st XI during the opening stages, the defence, as usual, rising to the occasion and keeping the attack of the opposing team at bay for nearly two-thirds of the first half. The forward line of the Bank could not get going, and many promising movements were spoiled by lack of combination and understanding.

This failing of the forward line gave the opportunity to the half-backs of the opponents to assist their own forwards, and it was only due to the fact that the Bank defence was at its best that both points were not forfeited.

After the resumption the Bank forwards came into the picture, and the Lloyds Bank goal underwent a very hot time, but our forwards seemed fated to put the ball in any place but the net, and it was left to a half-back to show them how to do it.

The half-back was Shaw, who received the ball near the half-way line and, instead of dilly-dallying, went straight for goal, with the result that

he fired in a shot that beat the opposing custodian all ends up.

The game now developed into a ding-dong struggle, and on many occasions Lloyds nearly equalised, but in some manner the ball was scrambled away to the Bank forwards, who promptly instituted a bombardment on Lloyds goal. With about five minutes to go, the efforts of Lloyds Bank forwards were rewarded, their inside-right scoring whilst Hochuli was unsighted.

The Bank fought hard to obtain the winning goal, but to no avail, and thus the 1st XI received their first set-back, although still retaining their unbeaten certificate.

Next Saturday the 1st XI are away to Trinity F.C. in the third round of the A.F.A. Minor Cup at Norbury.
