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
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SWISS MERCANTILE SOCIETY. Cinderella Dance at the Midfand Grand Hotel, St. Pancris.

Exhibition of Swiss Coloured Prints.

The Alpine Club arranged in its Galleries at 23, Savile Row (entrance Mill Street) for the month of December an Exhibition of Swiss Coloured Prints. In connection with the 'Cabinet des Estampes de l'École Polytechnique' in Zurich and the 'Musée des Beaux-Arts' in Berne, as well as by the assistance of the Club's members and friends (here are to be mentioned our Minister and Triends (here are to be mentioned our Minister and Madame C. R. Paravicini) a very interesting and carefully selected collection of over 200 of the

carefully selected collection of over 200 of the best and most typical prints have been gathered. The exhibits are of the period between 1770 and 1820, and represent masterly works by Aberli, Freudenberger, Koenig, Lory, Sprunglin, and other famous painters of this time. As works of art most of them show a very delicate perception, e.g., the lovely 'jungfrau,' by Aberli, and several scenes of family life, by Koenig. Also as prints, both in outlines and in colours, they are very well 'reproduced. reproduced.

There are as subjects splendid bright landscapes and ice-clad mountains, and a great number of old costumes from all parts of Switzerland, and very nice and intimate scenes of Swiss alpine life. In view of the beauty of our country, as well-as its absorbing interest in historical, in artistic, and in technical respects, the visitor will find many attractions, and, after all, the pictures will delight everyone in these days of hustle by the sunshine and peace of the 'good old time.' The Exhibition, open from 10 a.m: to 6 p.m., admission free, can be heartily recommended to every fellow-countryman. countryman.

The Swiss forward line on this occasion had been re-arranged, Tobler and Was filling the outside-right and inside-left positions respectively, with Gourbach in the centre. Quaife immediately on his right, and Holton on the extreme left. Bornand was unfit (and unfortunately still is), whilst Schwendener filled the vacancy created at right full-back by Herzog's depar-ture for Switzerland. This re-arrangement proved itself effective, and the Bank had no difficulty in establishing their superiority over Trinity. The first goal came from Glaser's boot, an unexpected drive from some distance out being successful. Quaife (2) and Holton (1) completed the total.

No special praise can be given to any particular player, with the possible exception of Schwendener, who occupied his new position with great success. He played well up the field, tackled cleanly and cleared with fine first-time efforts, which were not, at the same time, too strong to be of no use to the forwards. His speed showed up very much, but a tendency to dribble in the later stages of the game was noticeable. His success is worth special mention, since he was taken at short notice from, the inside-right position-something vashly different from full-back. A notable absentee from the team was Herzog, who has left England for Switzerland. His departure is keenly regretted, as was witnessed by the many tokens of appreciation which came from his colleagues. The Bank's opponents in the 4th round are the Gordon Hill on Saturday. Dec. 13th. The Bank beat Ludgate Circus II on Dec. 6th by one goal to nil. Thus they have still to be van-quished. The record now stands: Games played, 12; won, 10; drawn, 2.
