Yet, in spite of all these adverse circumstances, the Committee is able to report a slow, but steady increase of membership. It would be unfair to belittle or to try to over-look the great value of the Education Department as far as the increase in the number of members is concerned, as well as the enhanced prestige which the Society is deriving from it generally.
