Miss Brigitte Koelliker, Bienne: "English Life; Swiss Life."

On Friday evening a conference was given by the Headmaster, Mr. O. Ph. Masterman-Smith, on "British Constitutional Government at Home and in the Dominions." The attendance numbered nearly 200.

### THE FOYER SUISSE.

The annual meeting of the Trust was held at 15, Upper Bedford Place, W.C.1 on Monday, the 21st June, 1927, under the chairmanship of the Swiss Minister, Monsieur C. R. Paravicini. The agenda consisted of the ordinary statutory business of the Company, i.e., Financial Report, Secretary's Report, Election of Council of Management. The accounts for the financial year 1926-27 were presented by Mr. R. J. Dixon, F.L.A.A., and questions on the subject being fully answered, were duly accepted.

The following gentlemen were again elected to manage the affairs of the Trust for the coming year: Rev. R. Hoffmann-de Visme, President; G. Hafner, Vice-President; H. Barth, Hon. Treasurer; C. Bertschinger, Hon. Secretary; F. G. Sommer; H. Joss; J. Weber. Mr. R. J. Dixon was also re-elected as auditor for the same period. The Hon. Secretary's report, printed below, was read and unanimously approved and accepted.

Mr. Chairman, Gentlemen,—I have to-day the pleasure of putting before you the 9th Annual Report of the Company and the 4th year of the full actual operation of the Trust as registered at Somerset House on the 10th December, 1917.

After the strenuous pioneering work of the first three years we have D.M. reached a somewhat quieter period during the past twelve months. This has happily enabled some of us to test our positions and reflect on the correctness of our earlier outlines and visions. The result of this exercise has been most clear and unmistakable, and the Foyer Suisse as it stands to-day is the answer to a great need of our fellow countrymen. We are doing work of great public utility, and the continued financial prosperity is the natural reward due to all efficient, honest and unselfish efforts.

The Council has met four times during the year to receive the report of the House Committee and discuss and manage the current business.

Another £500 has been spent during last Autumn in order to complete the two basement rooms in Nos. 14 and 15, Upper Bedford Place. The first is reserved for the Scout Troop of the Union Chrétienne, and the other is the new public restaurant and tea room.

Some 450 young men of Swiss nationality have,

during the past year, made use of the domiciliary services of the Foyer, which again is a splendid proof of the popularity of the institution.

The splendid growth of the social activities, which was the chief feature of our previous report, has fortunately been maintained during the winter season. A general programme of social events was again published by the Secretary, and all the numerous groups which make use of the premises can report a normal year's work. As usual the Réunion de jeunes filles, Schwyzerchränzli, Réunion de couture des Dames, Nähverein, Ecole du Dimanche de l'Eglise Suisse and the Réunion de Catéchumènes have all had accommodation free of charge.

The Swiss Y.M.C.A., Union Chrét. de langue française and the Swiss Choral Society have all used our premises, as hitherto.

Contributions to other institutions in cash amount to £140, while the services rendered in reduction of rent, rates, taxes and provisions of lighting, heating, cleaning, etc., amount to at least £300 per annum.

Unfortunately we have to record through death the loss of a member, the late Mr. G. Aguet, who has rendered the Trust very valuable services. The faithful services rendered by our manager, Mr. W. Meyer, and his untiring devotion to duty, night and day, and seven days per week, as well as that of his staff, deserve the fullest appreciation and thanks of the Trust.

Special thanks are also due to Mr. F. Ineichen, who continues to assist in an honorary capacity, also to Mr. M. Goodman, our Solicitor, and Mr. R. J. Dixon, F.C.J.S., F.L.A.A., F.C.W.A., our Accountant.
