"The Guests" was proposed by Mons. Ch. Favre, President of the Entertainment Committee, who in the first instance extended a hearty welcome to the Swiss Minister. As regards the many representatives of their sister societies, he hoped their presence would help to further cement the cordial relations which subsisted between them. The following institutions were represented:—City Swiss Club, Mr. Jobin; Swiss Benevolent Society, Mr. Dupraz, President; Unione Ticinese, Mr. W. Notari; Schweizerbund, Mr. Louis Pache; Swiss Mercantile Society, Mr. J. Pfaendler; Choral Society, Mr. Manzoni; Swiss Rifle Association, Mr. Ch. Strubin; Gymnastic Society, Mr. Kummer; Cercle Valaisan, Mr. F. Delaloye; *Swiss Observer*, Mr. P. F. Boehringer.

Mr. R. Dupraz (President Swiss Benevolent Society) in returning thanks, said that his responding to this toast should give relief to both his audience and himself as for once he could divest himself of the self-inflicted rôle of universal beggar. He paid tribute to the devoted leaders of the Union Helvetia and hoped that the high ideals they had set themselves would be crowned with realisation.

After the toast to "The Ladies" had been suitably proposed by Mons. F. Delaloye and duly honoured,

Mons. C. R. Paravicini rose to distribute medals. He thought that to-day there were very few things in the world beyond dispute; one of them was that his audience was delighted to see him rising because he was the last speaker on the list. It struck him that if the admirable speeches they had heard that night were any criterion there could hardly be any necessity or use for the English school the Society had recently founded. He warmly sympathised with the plight of the president (M. Lehrian) in having been subjected to such hard treatment when in Switzerland; he would gladly offer his services in rendering M. Lehrian's future stay in Switzerland more supportable if his (the Minister's) diplomatic influence could be brought into action. However, he did not mind divulging that he too had at times been compelled to occupy a hard chair, but on retiring to a less irritating resting place he had always rejoiced in the soothing consolation that he had made another sacrifice for his country! The following members were presented with medals commemorating 25 years' membership:—Mr. W. Schulthess, Mr. E. Aellen, Mr. J. Sermier, Mr. A. Frey, Mr. A. Wyss.

A vote of thanks to the Minister, proposed by Mons. Lehrian, concluded the official part of the evening, which was followed by the traditional ball.
