CHURCH MATTERS.

(Communicated.)

The Consistoire of the Swiss Church (Communauté de langue française) held an Extraordinary Meeting on Wednesday the 23rd inst., at 79, Endell Street.

Among other items, the urgency of undertaking considerable repairs to the structure of the building engaged the attention of the meeting for some time.

Although the said repairs will involve a large sum of money (over £300) the Consistoire, in view of the great urgency of the matter, reluctantly decided that the work should be proceeded with at once. A Special Commission was nominated and entrusted with full powers to carry on.

M. Hoffmann-de Visme then informed the Consistoire that he had recently received pressing appeals from two different sources to transfer his activities to the Continent.

Anxious to serve his Master wherever he feels himself called upon to do so, M. Hoffmann asked the Consistoire to kindly give him their views, as a guide for the momentous decision he was to take.

After a brief deliberation in private, the Consistoire unanimously came to the conclusion that the Swiss Church, the Sunday School, and many other institutions in London, could not possibly be deprived of the devoted services of both Mr. and Mrs. Hoffmann. It was resolved, therefore, that he should earnestly be urged to remain at his post.

This resolution having been conveyed to M. Hoffmann he stated, to the great relief of all present, that such a unanimous expression of appreciation removed all further hesitation from his mind and that he was both willing and happy to continue, with renewed courage and energy, the work he had begun nearly seventeen years ago.

The numerous members of the Colony who have had occasion to appreciate Mr. and Mrs. Hoffmann-de Visme's invaluable activities will, we feel sure, rejoice at this decision and take it to heart to assist them in their great task.
