SWISS RIFLE ASSOCIATION. BISLEY MEETING.

The Swiss Rifle Association paid the customary annual visit to the Bisley Camp on Tuesday last, the 3rd of July. The party consisted of about 20 members and friends, two teams of 4 having been selected to compete on the 100 yards Miniature Range. The following results were obtained:—

Team A.—J. C. Wetter 96, J. Haesler 95, E. R. Hirt 92, Alfred Schmid 90. Total 373 out of a possible 400.

Team B.—Arnold Schmid 93, H. Holliger 93, G. Burger 86, P. de Vincenti 80. Total 352 out of possible 400.

Practice (Best Results).—(100 yds.): Alfred Schmid 98, J. C. Wetter 98, ditto 97, H. Holliger 96, ditto 94, E. R. Hirt 96, C. O. Brullhard 95, J. Haesler 94. (50 yds., Pistol): G. Burger 93, P. de Vincenti 97, ditto 93.

These results are most encouraging; the score of 373 out of a possible 400 has not been reached before by any team of the Swiss Rifle Association, and we are now eagerly looking forward to see the results which will be known at the end of the Bisley Meeting.

There are 4 prizes and a shield; the number of clubs competing, however, is a large one.

By the way, it is worth while stating that we were indeed surprised to see the Swiss Army rifle used by two English competitors on the 1,000 and 1,100 yd. targets—"The Edge"—a match rifle event.

15 shots at 1,000 yards was won by Mr. A. E. Martin, of Glasgow, with an aggregate of 142, using Swiss rifle and ammunition. We understood that no rifles of foreign make could be used and further enquiries are now being made. Should permission be granted our riflemen would have to get used to the 200 and 400 ranges as 300 is considered an outrage. Ch. S.
