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advocated in energetic terms the solidarity of the various economic groups.

Examining the possible means of increasing both the agricultural and the industrial production, he concluded that the latter had well defined limits.

To the Editor of the *Swiss Observer*.

Dear Sir,—In No. 348 of the *Swiss Observer* a notice from the *Evening Standard* was reproduced saying that Switzerland was second with regard to her national wealth, the figure being £599 per head of the inhabitants.

I am unable to say anything with regard to the other countries mentioned in that particular notice, as I have no material handy. Concerning the figures for Switzerland, however, the estimate as given seems to be very near the truth, as far as this can be ascertained.

Julius Wyler, the eminent Swiss statistician, basing his estimates on the figures for 1924, comes to the conclusion that the national income in Switzerland was then 8,55 milliard francs. This equals francs 2,180 per head of the population. Of this eight-and-a-half milliard francs, 6,81 milliards are the result of labour and the remaining 2,24 milliards that of investments of every kind.

Wyler's figures have been assailed by one or two critics, but they still seem to be the nearest approach to the real amount. I personally have the idea that his second figure, that of Interest and Dividends, is too small. It is certainly too small in relation to the earned income. But his calculations are on the safe side in any case, so they must suffice for the purpose.

The national capital is computed at something like fifty milliard Swiss francs. Now this figure tallies with a capitalisation figure for the unearned income (20 x 2,240 millions). Such figure, however, only includes interest-bearing property. There are quite a number of things which have real money value, although they do not bear interest or dividends.

Pre-war statistics arrived at the figure of approx. four milliards total national wealth. If we consider that the Swiss franc has since 1913 been reduced in purchasing power to 67 per cent. and correct accordingly the old figure, the basis for which has not altered to any considerable extent, then we arrive at a national wealth figure of fifty-nine milliard francs. Now £599 per head of the Swiss population would give a total of 58,402 million francs. So we find that the figure given in the Press notice mentioned cannot be very far out.
