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OLD FOLKS CHRISTMAS LUNCHEON
AT THE FOYER SUISSE.

On Monday the 15th December, this most unique gathering of some 40 Old Folks of the Swiss Colony again took place, the Swiss Minister, Mr. C. R. Paravicini, presiding.

After the reception in the drawing room the guests took their seats in the brilliantly decorated hall of No. 15, Upper Bedford Place, which had been turned into a charming banquetting room by the manager, Mr. W. Meyer. There a special Xmas dinner awaited them, prepared for the occasion and most daintily served by the staff of the Foyer. At the same time the Swiss violinist, Mr. André Loewe, accompanied on the piano by Mr. Aug. Dejung, greatly cheered the company by a programme of appropriate music. After dinner Mr. Paravicini addressed the party and gave expression to his great pleasure in meeting so many of the doyen of the Swiss Colony in such a happy atmosphere and such pleasant surroundings as those of the Foyer Suisse. He congratulated his hearers on their wonderful fitness and health that permitted this festive occasion in mid-Winter, also noting the fact that so many were well past the three score years and ten. At the close of his speech the Minister called upon the senior member of the gathering and presented her with a silver medal specially struck for the day and engraved:

"To the ven. senior of the Swiss reunion, 1930, Mrs. Edwards, née Landis, born 8th June, 1845."

This ceremony came as a great surprise and called for most enthusiastic applause. The Rev. Hoffmann-de Visme, president of the Trust, and Mr. Th. Ritter also spoke a few words tendering heartiest wishes for a happy Xmas and a bright New Year.

May we hope that the memory of this Yuletide afternoon spent at the Foyer Suisse will brighten up the long dark Winter days of many of our dear old people in the metropolis. C.B.
