#### A PROSPEROUS BENEVOLENT SOCIETY.

The Swiss Benevolent Society in Rome celebrated a few days ago the hundredth anniversary of its foundation. Originally established for the purpose of supporting necessitous families of retired or deceased Swiss Papal Guards its activities gradually extended. According to the report for 1929 the Society possesses funds amounting to about 200,000 Lire; whilst the revenue derived from interest and individual contributions reached about 21,000 Lire, the moneys spent on relieving needy Swiss does not exceed 11,000 Lire.

Mr. Deutsch then informed the students of the forthcoming Swiss Sports Meeting at Herne Hill on May 24th, and expressed the hope that the students would support this patriotic Meeting as in former years. He also made an announcement regarding the Dinner to be held in honour of our Minister, Monsieur C. R. Paravicini, on the occasion of the tenth anniversary of his appointment in London. The evening finished with an excellent musical programme rendered by the students.

The school was closed for ten days and reopened on Tuesday after Easter.
