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FEDERAL.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS DELEGATION.

The Federal Council has designated the fol-lowing Gentlemen to represent the Swiss Con-federation at the next session of the League of Nations: M. G. Motta, President of the Swiss Confederation, Professors Max Huber and W. Rappard, Nat. Councillor Dollfus, and State Councillor Baumann and Director W. Stucki, State Councillor Keller (Aarau) has asked to be overset from nomination exempt from nomination.

THE NEW HEAD OF THE INTERNATIONAL LABOUR OFFICE AT GENEVA.

As successor to Albert Thomas, the late Director of the International Labour Office, M. H. B. Butler, has been elected. The new head of this important Institution was born in 1885 at Oxford, where he graduated at the University. M. Butler was for many years a high official at the home office, and was one of the delegates at the Paris Peace Conference; at the Washington Labour Conference he acted as General Secretary. General Secretary.

GERMAN FOREIGN SECRETARY AT THE FEDERAL PALAIS.

M. v. Neurath, the German Foreign Minister has paid a visit to M. G. Motta, President of the Swiss Confederation at Berne. In the evening a dinner took place at the German Embassy to which the members of the Federal Council were invited.

SWISS BANKERS AT WARSCHAU.

Several leading Swiss Bankers have arrived at Warschau in order to discuss the question of a loan to the town of Warschau.

BANK FOR INTERNATIONAL SETTLEMENTS.

The statement of the Bank for International The statement of the Bank for International Settlements as at 30th June shows total resources of Frs. (Swiss) 1,109,927,528. The cash item is Frs.17,932,908, or 1.6 per cent. of the statement total. On the liabilities side long-term deposits amount to. Frs. 299,301,446, or 27 per cent., and short-term and sight deposits to Frs. 606,635,616, or 54.6 per cent or 54.6 per cent.

SWITZERLAND AND GERMAN EXCHANGE CONTROL.

Severe restrictions placed by Switzerland on German imports have led to a marked relaxation in favour of Switzerland of the German foreign exchange control. Anybody may now send or take from Germany foreign exchange up to 700m, a month to Switzerland. The same figure holds good for Austria. Two hundred marks is the most that may be sent or taken without special authori-ration to any other country

that may be sent or taken without special authori-zation to any other country. Switzerland had recently forbidden the im-port of German coal and coke. The German con-cession in regard to foreign exchange immediately followed, and the Swiss import ban on German coal and coke has now been raised. These German imports, with sugar and malt, will now be ad-mitted up to last year's monthly quantity.

C. F. BALLY A.G. (HOLDING) SCHOENENWERD.

The directors of this concern have passed the accounts for 1931-1932. The net profit amounts to 306, 293, 08 frs. against 2, 864, 960, 54 frs. the previous year. The directors propose not to pay any dividend (last year 6%) but to carry forward the profit to new account.

SWISS WATCHES.

The Swiss watch industry, 95 per cent. of whose total production used to be exported, has suffered a terrible setback as a result of the world financial crisis.

mancial crisis. In 1929, 20,758,000 watches and watch move-ments, valued at £12,293,650, were exported, whereas according to the latest statistics exports for 1931 fell to 11,554,000 watches, with a total of £5,745,680.

POWERFUL SWISS LOCOMOTIVES.

The two most powerful railway engines in the world have just been put into service on the St. Gothard Railway, which connects Central Switzerland with Italy.

They are electrically driven and have been designed to give tremendous power because of the severity of the gradients which have to be powerited. negotiated.

The larger of the two locomotives develops The larger of the two reconstructs develops 8800 horsepower. It weighs 244 tons. Its brakes are so powerful that it can be brought to a dead stop from a speed of 40 miles an hour within a few seconds. It is driven by 16 of the latest type about a weatow

electric motors. Up to now the world's most powerful locomo-tive was an American goods engine which developed 7125 horsepower.

SWISS STUDENTS AT PORT SUNLIGHT.

A party of 150 members of the Swiss Mercan-tile Students Association travelled by special train from London to Port Sunlight, for the purpose of inspecting the Works and Offices of Messrs. Lever Bros. Ltd., and witnessing the manufac-turing processes of the various products made at Port Sunlight. After a tour of the works and the village the visite wave enterpined to the in the village, the visitors were entertained to tea in the Hulme Hall, Port Sunlight.

LADY COMMUNIST EXPELLED

Mme.-E. Loucar, who took an active part in the communist troubles at Zurich, has been ex-pelled from Switzerland, she is an Austrian subject.

MINISTER RUEFENACHT'S FAREWELL AUDIENCE.

Minister Rüfenacht, who is relinquishing his post as Swiss Minister in Berlin, was received by President Hinderburg from whom he has taken leave.

50th JUBILEE OF THE SALVATION ARMY IN SWITZERLAND.
