JACQUES STEINER †

Immediately the hostilities ceased in Europe, the hope of many Swiss in Great Britain to see the Home Country rise to new heights.

No one felt that desire more keenly than Jacques Alexandre Steiner, but it was not to be, he was not to see again the Switzerland he loved so much.

Jacques Alexandre Steiner passed away on Monday, January 28th, 1946, at the age of 73 at his home, 22, Kedleston Avenue, Victoria Park, Manchester, after a very short illness. His robust constitution and his unbending spirit gave to all who saw him during his illness the illusion that he would pull through; the news of his death came as a great shock to his compatriots.

M. Steiner, who came to this country about fifty years ago, took an immense and beneficent interest in the affairs of the Swiss Colony in Manchester. In 1922 and 1923, he served as Secretary of the Swiss Club Manchester and assumed its Presidency for two years in 1928/1929. But it was especially to the Manchester Swiss Relief Society that of late he devoted his time, energy and abilities. He was consulting member from 1923 to 1928; in 1931 he was elected President and retained this office up to the day of his death.

Everyone who came in contact with M. Steiner was immediately attracted by his simplicity, his amiability, his friendliness. All those who had the good fortune to know him will mourn his passing and will cherish his memory.

To his family goes the heartfelt sympathy of the Swiss Colony in Manchester.

During the war the school has remained open, and it numbers at present some 60 girls, half of whom are Swiss. The English Branch, which was opened at Shrewsbury during the war, is closing in April.

As soon as Exchange Control Regulations permit, pupils from England will be received again.
