A special train, carrying 542 German children, has arrived in Basle, 250 of whom will be placed in families in the cantons of Appenzell, the remainder will be sent to families in other parts of the country. [A.T.S.]

The last of the crippled children sent to Switzerland from France, six months ago, have now returned to their country.

They were treated in special clinics in Zurich and Lausanne. [A.T.S.]

The Tribunal of the 4th Division, sitting in Basle, passed the following sentences for espionage during the last war: Corporal Heinzmann: 20 years penal servitude, degradation and expulsion from the army; Schleiniger, Manfred: 13 years penal servitude; Baumgartner, Louis: 12 years penal servitude and expulsion from the army; sentences varying from five months to three years were passed on seven others of the accused. Following an invitation by the Swiss Press Association, a number of Czecho-Slovakian Journalists have arrived in Switzerland for a fortnights stay. They are visiting the towns of Berne, Basle, Geneva, Lucerne and Zurich. On their arrival at Dübendorf they were greeted by Dr. Meier, President of the Zurich Press Association. [A.T.S.]

The French Premier, Monsieur Paul Ramadier, landed at the Airport Basle-Mulhouse, and was greeted by the Director of the aerodrome, Ch. Koepke, to whom he expressed his satisfaction that the international airport has come into being. He also thanked the Swiss authorities and the Swiss people for the spontaneous reception which they had accorded to General de Lattre de Tassigny, Chief of the French General Staff, during his recent visit to Switzerland.
