Swiss Parliament will make special provisions for conscientious objectors to military service.

Some time ago the motion, carried in Parliament by a narrow majority, placed the matter in the hands of the Government, which will draw up a Bill providing for non-combatant service for men whose conscience prevents them from serving in the armed forces.

At present no reason other than ill-health will secure dispensation, and refusal to bear arms is punish-

able by imprisonment.

M. Kobelt, head of the Federal Military Department, who opposed the measure, said that, out of a million men called to arms during the war, only 76 refused to serve for reasons of conscience, and of this number only those who refused to serve as hospital orderlies were sent to prison.

A modus operandi between Spain and Switzerland has been reached whereby trade between the two countries will be greatly increased. Spanish business men can now apply for export and import licences to Switzerland. Agreement has also been reached for 5,000 tons of bananas to be sent from the Canary Islands to Switzerland this year.

Two items have been dropped from the rationing list in Switzerland. Households are no longer checked on consumption of gas, but coal allocations to gasmanufacturing plants are limited.

Rationing of unsugared condensed milk, imported

and domestic production was lifted. •

A distinguished citizen of the canton of Obwalden has died at Sarnen in the person of Otto Seiler, who occupied the post of "Kantonsingenieur" from 1900-1932. He was a member of the "Obwalder Kantonsrat" for fifteen years, and reached the rank of colonel of infantry in the army. [A.T.S.]

With Maggis Aspic Jelly valuable additions may be made to war-time menus. From meat, fish and vegetable "left-overs" attractive supplementary dishes can be contrived.

INVALID ASPIC

Maggis Aspic Jelly in a small mould daintily served with two or three small strips of toast will be a welcome change from "beef tea."

FISH ASPIC

Cod or Salmon remaining from the boiled fish can be used, also prawns or shrimps. Fill the mould 2 full and when nearly set put in the flakes of fish and fill up.

MEAT ASPIC

Cooked fresh sausage meat or meat left over from the joints may be used minced. Drop the meat into the jelly before setting and serve with a little watercress or cress.

ASPIC SANDWICHES

Spread the slices of bread with margarine and then with a thin layer of jelly. Add grated cheese, watercress, mustard and cress, meat or fish paste.

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The medical practitioners of the canton of Zurich have gone on strike. Some time ago, a dispute had arisen between the doctors and the "Verband der Krankenkassen" with regard to the fees to be paid.

As no satisfactory solution could be found, the medical practitioners have refused to attend the members belonging to the "Krankenkassen." [A.T.S.]

A memorial service was held on Friday, May 9th, at the Mittelholzer monument at Dübendorf on the occasion of the 10th anniversary of his death.

Amongst those who attended the simple but impressive service, were the managers of Swissair, E. Groh, Dr. G. von Meiss, and E. Bethge, as well as the wife and son of the late aviator; and members of the staff of the company.

Colonel Edwin Schwarzenbach, a member of the Board of Swissair, and a personal friend of Mittelholzer, paid a moving tribute to the great aviator, and

placed a laurel wreath on his resting place.

The old, old tale of a rich uncle in America, still finds believers. A twenty-five year-old married woman in Zurich, who has been arrested, has managed within three years to swindle three people to the tune of 150,000.— frs. (100,000.— frs. in one case and 50,000.— frs. in two other cases.) This expectant heiress kept an expensive establishment, and entertained lavishly. Her husband an artist (stateless) will be charged with complicity. [A.T.S.]

From Zurich comes the news of the death of Dr. Hermann Stoll at the age of 84. The deceased was one of the founders of the well-known Maggi concern in Kempthal. In 1889, he was appointed—General Manager of the firm, and later on occupied the post of Vice-President, since 1939 he acted as Chairman of the Board.

Dr. Stoll also held the post of President of the Board of the "Schweizerischen Kredit-Anstalt" from 1929-1940. The University of Zurich conferred on him the degree of doctor honoris causa in 1928. [A.T.S]

The heirs of the late Dr. Karl Gyr, head of the firm Landis & Gyr in Zug, have presented the town Council of Zug with a cheque of 100,000.— frs. for the foundation of an infant welfare centre. [A.T.S.]

The death occurred in Zug of Fritz Kunz, one of the best known church painters in Switzerland. Some of his most important paintings can be found in the churches of Zurich, Olten, Romanshorn, Ingebohl, Menzingen, Stans, Disentis and Cham. He reached the age of 79. [A.T.S.]

A fisherman from Ligerz, caught near the St. Peter's Island, lake of Bienne, a pike measuring 1m.25cm., weighing 25kg. [A.T.S.]

The Mayor of Berne, Dr. E. Bärtschi, has informed the Mayor of the town of Budapest, who recently was his guest, that a couple of bears, coming from the well-known bear pit in the Federal capital, will be sent to Budapest as a present from the town of Berne. [A.T.S.]

A "Piper" machine crashed at the "Burgerallmend" in Thun. The pilot, a flying instructor from Berne and his passenger received serious injuries, and the machine was badly damaged. [A.T.S.] Colonel Dr. Fritz Maurer, chief veterinary surgeon of the 1st Army-Corps, during the last war, has died at Lyss at the age of 59. [A.T.S.]

The married couple Schwitzguebel-Schmid in Bienne have celebrated their diamond-wedding anniversary (60 years). The husband is 95 and the wife 87 years old, both enjoy good health. [A.T.S.]

Ernest Schneeberger, Manager of the Watch Manufacturing Works, Frey & Co., in Bienne, has died at the age of 53. [A.T.S.]

Street accidents in the canton of Berne are still on the increase; during the month of April, 184 persons were injured of whom twelve died. [A.T.S.]

The oldest member of the Association of advocates of the canton of Berne, in the person of Oskar Salvisberg, has died at Grünen near Sumiswald at the age of 80. [A.T.S.]

Since, the beginning of this month the railwayline Fribourg-Payerne has been electrified. To celebrate this event a banquet was held at Fribourg, at which members of the cantonal government were present. The Swiss Federal Railways were represented by M. Paschoud, General-Manager. [A.T.S.]

Jules Bovet has celebrated his 60th birthday anniversary in Fribourg, which coincides also with him being a member of the cantonal government for the last twenty years. [A.T.S.]

Dr. Rolf Meier, Professor of Pharmacology at the University of Basle, has been made an Honorary member of the medical academy of Barcelona. [A.T.s.]

General A. Osborn, Head of the Salvation Army, has arrived in Basle, and was received by officials of the local branch of the Salvation Army. The General is visiting several towns in Switzerland. [A.T.S.]

The death is reported from Basle, of Dr. Schär at the age of 79, The deceased was for many years closely connected with the Swiss Co-operative movement and President of the Swiss Co-operative Society.

"The Motor," in their issue of May 14th, gives a valuable tip to motorists visiting our country, by writing:—



Economics

With regard to the lastest communication from the B.I.S. the "Financial Times" in their issue

of the 15th inst. writes:-

"The statement of account of the Bank for International Settlements as at 31st March last shows as a separate item the funds invested in Germany. These assets total 291.2 million Swiss gold francs. All have their origin in funds which were placed on the German market in the years 1930 and 1931 in fulfilment of the obligations laid upon the Bank by the Hague Agreements. No new funds have been placed in Germany since 1931.

On the other hand, the long-term deposits received in application of the Hague Agreements are shown on the liabilities side of the statement of account at the total amount of 228.9 million Swiss gold francs. The legal position with regard to the rights and obligations of the bank under the Hague Agreements in respect of its assets in Germany and the long-term deposits entrusted to it has not been altered by the suspension of the annuity payments.

The bank has drawn the attention of the Governments concerned to its rights under the terms of the agreements in force in respect of its funds in Germany and has requested that these should be fully safeguarded.

There is no indication in the accounts or in an


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accompanying communiqué if, and to what extent, the bank's assets in Germany are covered by gold deposits and foreign balances owned by the Reichsbank.

The assets of the B.I.S. as at 31st March, other than the funds invested in Germany, amount to about 208,000,000 Swiss gold francs, of which 83,000,000 Swiss gold francs is represented by bar gold, held chiefly in Berne, New York and London. The remaining assets total 125 million Swiss gold francs, and almost the whole is expressed in dollars or Swiss francs, or is repayable in gold.

Our Political Correspondent writes: The future of the B.I.S. and the effect of the outcome of the war on the control of its share capital is the subject of two questions tabled by Colonel Crosthwaite-Eyre. It is now believed in usually well-informed quarters that, contrary to their original intentions, the Allied Governments do not at present intend to liquidate the

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bank, and the resolution passed to that effect by the Bretton Woods Conference will not be carried out.

Humanitarian

The first batch of British War Invalids have arrived in Prévérenges near Morges, where they

will stay for three months. An amount of Frs. 300,000 has been collected in Switzerland for British War Invalids of which nearly half of this amount has been collected in the canton of Berne.

The next Federal Singing competition will take place in Berne in the month of June in 1948.

Five members of a Swiss mountaineering expedition which will soon start climbing operations in the Karakoram and Gangotri ranges in the Himalayas have arrived at Karachi. The expedition will divide itself into two parties. One will proceed to Gilgit, reaching the foot of the Karakoram in June, while the second party will follow the pilgrims' trail through Badrinath to the Gangotri peak, where the River Ganges rises.

Statistics for last year show a great improvement in Switzerland's demographic situation which for years has been causing considerable concern.

Last year the number of marriages was 38,747, the

highest ever attained in Switzerland.

Births also show a considerable increase — 89,102 only 8,000 less than the highest figure ever recorded, which was in 1901.

Last year the birthrate exceeded 20 per thousand, the minimum recorded being approximately 14 per thousand in 1937. The proportion of births over deaths was 38,867 beating the 1902 record by 88.

The situation is stated to be due to progressive social legislation and improved economic conditions.

During the last 30 years military statistics show that the average height of males in Switzerland has increased about two inches.

72nd FETE SUISSE.

As announced elsewhere in this paper, the traditional Fête Suisse — the 72nd of its kind — will be held on Saturday, 14th June, at 5.30 p.m. at the Central Hall, Westminster.

This ancient annual reunion, which dates from 1864, needs no introduction to the Swiss residents of London. Its popularity, its strong patriotic appeal have made it what it is. And well they know why more hundreds from year to year have flocked to it until the 1,000 mark was passed in 1935 to reach nearly 1,600 in 1939. Then came the war, which put a temporary stop to this great gathering and sent home a good many of our young people. Last year, this annual event in the Swiss colony was renewed; over 900 compatriots and friends patronised it and showed that the Fête Suisse had not been forgotten but, indeed, had remained dear to their heart.

Once again, an attractive programme has been arranged which will delight all, old and young, and will bring back happy memories, to many. Real alpine flowers freshly gathered from our mountains will, it is hoped, arrive in time to bring greetings from our homeland.

The doors will open at 5 p.m. There will be the usual long interval in the programme to enable friends to meet, and the end is timed for 9 p.m. There will be teas and light refreshments for all, and how good they always are!

So do come to the Central Hall on Saturday, 14th June. Tickets at 2/- for adults and 1/- for children can be obtained in advance or at the door on the day. Incidentally, you will help the Swiss Benevolent Society.

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
