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SWISS YOUTH CLUB.

The Swiss Youth Club is sadly in need of some more furniture of its own and a little more active support from the Colony. Its chairs and tables are on loan only, they have to be moved back and forth each day the club is open from the adjoining room in Duke Street. The building will shortly be subject to comprehensive alterations and decorations as the future Swiss Legation in London, when the Swiss Youth Club will have to find alternative accommodation. It is filling an important function particularly by providing a homely atmosphere for informal dances on Saturdays. It is the only place where the Swiss girls in London can go to dance unaccompanied and at a nominal charge. But it is hoped to make the place attractive to the young in our Colony also on other week days. For the time being it will be open only on Tuesday evenings 6—10 p.m. apart from Saturdays.

What is needed is the more active support of members of the Colony: (a) as patron members paying at least £1 per annum and attending at least occasionally, and (b) as donors or lenders of club furniture, and (c) as volunteers to share in the task of superintending the Club on alternate dates with the two ladies who have so far been doing this alone. All offers of help in any of these alternative forms should be addressed to Mrs. A. The library of the Nouvelle Société Helvétique, newly reorganised, enriched and catalogued, has been temporarily installed at the Youth Club. Books may be borrowed by members and friends of the N.S.H. on Tuesdays 6—10 p.m. It is hoped that liberal use will be made of this facility by the Colony.
